## 225 ARE ABSENT AT ROLL CALL

### Drafted Men Called Preparatory to Sunday's Departure Fail to Respond.

after the hour of entrainment on Sunday night, although they are slackers and liable to arrest on suspicion of trying to evade the orders of the board.

### One Arrested.

One arrest was made this morning at the city hall during the roll call. Erick W. Johnson, when he found that a large number of men were not answering roll call, did not answer "Present" when his own name was called. As he started to leave the hall a drafted man stopped him and reported him to Charles Treacy of the city board.

"I will fight for America but I won't go to Europe," Johnson told Treacy. "Then, do you mean to say that you won't go with the drafted men on Sunday night?" asked Treacy.

"No, I won't go," said Johnson. Detective Frank White settled Johnson's case by putting the drafted man under arrest. Johnson will be sent under guard to Camp Lewis Sunday night with two other men charged as slackers now held in the city jail.

During the calling of the roll a number of the drafted men, their enthusiasm growing with each name called, created a confusion that necessitated a talk from Mayor Maloney.

### Mayor Calls for Order.

"Keep as quiet as you can and let us hear the men who answer roll call," said the mayor. "You must remember that this is a serious affair and that the men who do not answer to their names this morning will be arrested at once as slackers. So give every man a chance to hear his name called."

When the mayor announced that the arrest of the slackers would begin at noon, the other drafted men began to applaud and cheer, calling out, "That's right!" "Let us help you get the slackers!" and "We're with you!"

When one name was called and no answer was made, a young man in the hall audibly muttered, "I know that guy and I'll see that they get him into jail before night." The drafted men who answered to roll call this morning were plain in their attitude toward the slackers who have doubled the burden of others. They gathered in squads outside the hall and talked over ways and means of helping round up the tardy men. They even went to the board members and volunteered to help locate men who failed to report this morning.

### Many Alien Absentees.

Many of the men who failed to answer roll call in the city this morning are aliens who have claimed exemption and have been denied. In the matter of drafting about the city board has been upheld by the district board, and the federal authorities have announced that the action of the district board in such matters is final. Appeals from the action of the district boards can be made only in the cases of men claiming exemption on the grounds of industry or agriculture.

## JOINS THE RANKS OF 'WAR BRIDES'

### Mary Howe is United to B. A. Loucks, Who Leaves With Conscripts Sunday.

Mary Howe, a prepossessing young woman, formerly of Butte but now residing in Divide, joined the ranks of the "war brides" last night when she became the wife of B. A. Loucks of Divide, one of Silver Bow's drafted men who will leave with the next quota on Sunday for American Lake.

At the Acoma hotel, where the youthful groom is stopping with his bride, the romance leaked out this morning. Loucks, who is station operator for the Montana Power company at Divide, met his bride some months ago. The young couple became engaged two months ago and it was their intention to marry this winter, but when Loucks was accepted for the draft and ordered to American Lake, he suggested marriage.

The suggestion was accepted by the bride. Together the young couple came to Butte late yesterday and after securing a marriage license repaired to the rectory of St. John's Episcopal church, where the Rev. Charles F. Chapman joined them in wedlock.

It is the intention of Mrs. Loucks to remain in Divide until her husband returns from the war. There is a possibility, however, that she will journey to Tacoma to bid him good-bye should he be ordered to France at the end of the training period.

Loucks is 24 years old. His bride is of the same age. Mrs. Loucks is the third war bride of Silver Bow county. In the contingent that left for American Lake two weeks ago, there were two war grooms, one from Butte and the other from the county.

## WOMAN PARADES IN A SOLDIER'S DRESS

Many of the passengers on the car noticed that the wearer was a woman but no one could understand what was the meaning of the disguise. The disguise was first noticed at Front and Utah streets. A well-known Butte man and his wife were aboard. He said:

"That's a woman wearing the U. S. uniform."

His wife agreed with him. There was much talk among the passengers but no satisfactory explanation could be evolved to tell what was the reason for the masquerade. To the credit of the young lady it may be said that she appeared very much as a fine looking soldier.

## REVELERS PUSH A MAN THROUGH OPEN WINDOW

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 21.—Louis McCarrell, a barber, aged 28, was killed about daylight this morning when he fell or was thrown from a second-story window of a hotel on Westlake avenue to the sidewalk below. Mrs. Claudie Boyd, aged 25; Mrs. Teddy Martin, aged 27, and W. E. Weiborn, an electrician, aged 22, have been arrested in connection with the case. Passers-by who saw McCarrell fall said they thought a bundle of clothes was dropping. The prisoners said they had returned from a dance. A bottle of whiskey with McCarrell's name on the permit was found in Mrs. Boyd's room. The police say that apparently the three persons arrested were making a disturbance; that McCarrell went into their room to quiet them and was pushed through the open window.

## CUT OFF ALL SUPPLIES OF ALCOHOL IN RUSSIA

Petrograd, Sept. 21.—With a view to promoting temperance permanently the provisional government has ordered that all supplies of alcohol at distilleries and on licensed premises shall be used for the manufacture of vinegar and mineral waters. These products, it is specified, shall not contain more than one per cent alcohol.

John Arkola a Finlander 31 years old, is the name of the man who committed suicide late yesterday afternoon by leaping into the open shaft of the Moonlight mine. The body fell a distance of 1,200 feet and was badly mangled and torn by the fall.

Arkola, who lived at 361 East Granite street, had made previous attempts to end his life, according to the story of friends. Arkola was a single man and had worked in Butte about three years. His relatives are in Finland.

Trustkeeper Baird of the Moonlight and two miners tried to stop Arkola as they saw him running toward the shaft. Corner Lase will hold an inquest tonight at 7 o'clock.
