DEAD MAN FOUND.

Helena, Sept. 25.—The body of George Curtis, 75, a prominent citizen of Marysville who had been missing more than a year, was found today on top of a mountain near the town. Curtis disappeared on Sept. 6, 1916, while hunting chickens. He had evidently become lost and died of exhaustion.

TO ORGANIZE BOYS.

Lieut. J. W. Thibault, organizer for the Naval Scouts of America, has announced that he soon expects to form a scout organization among the boys of Butte. He has written to Washington for permission to form a troop among the boys. Any boy between the ages of 12 and 15 is eligible to join the organization. Lieutenant Thibault is located at the courthouse in the naval recruiting office.

NEW INSECT THAT EATS SCALE PESTS APPEARS

Porterville, Cal., Sept. 25.—Discovery of a new insect, which appears to be eating large quantities of scale insects in Porterville district orchards, may result in a natural control for the pest. The insect is of immense economic importance. The new insect, specimens of which have been sent to the state entomologist for identification, is of the Australian flycatcher class, but is new to entomologists here. It has a voracious appetite and in the course of a day will eat many times its own bulk in gray scale.

SHIPMENT OF CATTLE FOR EASTERN MARKET

Dillon, Sept. 25.—The largest shipment of cattle to ever leave Beaverhead county was made from Moinda to the eastern markets Saturday. The shipment was valued at \$100,000 and was composed of 1,485 head. The train had 55 cars and a private coach for the shippers. Duff, Rife and Metzger shipped 800 steers and fat cows in the lot and A. L. Metzger had 253 white-faced steers, 2 and 3 years old. The rest of the bunch was made up of small lots from farmers in the Centennial valley.

The lack of an electric transformer is delaying the opening of the new Stevensville flour mill. Every other piece of machinery is in place and the bins are being filled with wheat for grinding.

Helena school children who are actually in attendance at the different public schools in the city number 1,785 at the present time. 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
QUIET WEDDING AT ST. ROSE CHURCH


DEER LODGE BRIEFS.
