"There's a woman in congress now," Cecilia says, "and there'll soon be more. So why not girl pages?" "The woman congressmen will need them. I want to study law later and I think the house job will help me a lot."

DAYLIGHT ROBBERY IN DENTIST'S OFFICE

Gold Fillings Worth \$175 Stolen From Dr. J. J. Davis' Safe.

A daylight robbery, one of the most daring in years in Butte, was committed yesterday afternoon between the hours of 5 and 7 o'clock when gold tooth fillings, valued at between \$150 and \$175, were stolen from the safe in Dr. J. J. Davis' dental office in the Owsley block. Some cash was also taken from the safe.
The robber or robbers effected an entrance over the partition separating the waiting office from the workshop. The front door of the office was open at that time of the day. The safe door was pried open and locked again. No clue has been obtained to the robbers, but the matter has been placed in the hands of the police.

RENEWAL OF POLITICAL EXCITEMENT IN FINLAND

Petrograd, Sept. 25.—A renewal of political excitement in Helsinki, Finland, is reported in the press. The diet, which was dissolved and prevented forcibly from assembling recently, will make another attempt Friday to resume sittings.
Lethal workmen who have escaped from occupied Russian territory report that six members of a local council of soldiers and workmen's delegates have been shot for refusing to assist in the construction of military works.

AMERICAN SOLDIER GOES TO PRISON FOR ATTACK ON JAPANESE

Nagasaki, Japan, Sept. 25.—Manuel Neumoil, a bandsman attached to the Thirtieth United States infantry, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment and fined 3,000 yen after conviction on the charge of inflicting fatal injuries on a Japanese tradesman.

The complaint admitted that the crime was not intentional and that it occurred during intoxication. In escaping from the police, Neumoil is said to have knocked over a toilet powder manufacturer. It was alleged that the Japanese was kicked and that he received internal injuries from which he died five hours later.
The public prosecutor recommended penal servitude for ten years. The fine was imposed in connection with a civil action instituted by the family of the victim.

WRETCHED TREATMENT OF PRISONERS BY GERMANS

London, Sept. 25.—Details concerning the treatment by the Germans of British prisoners in German East Africa are contained in a White Paper just issued. The paper contains a mass of testimony recited by prisoners and others, including a number of women, to the effect that the Germans deliberately adopted a policy to lower the prestige of the British in the eyes of the natives, forcing them to do all manner of degrading work and subjecting them to terrible hardships without food, clothing and shelter.

TRIAL FOR FORMER WAR MINISTER CLOSES

Petrograd, Sept. 25.—Counsel for General Soukhomlinoff, former minister of war, who is being tried on the charge of high treason, concluded the defense today. They declared the accusations against the general were unfounded.
