APPLICANTS MAKE BETTER SHOWING

Examination for Citizenship Today More Satisfactory Than Yesterday.

The persons who appeared before Judge McClernan today for examination for citizenship papers made a much better showing than the men who were on the calendar for hearing yesterday. Of the 23 who appeared today 13 were given their second papers, as compared with five out of a class of 42 yesterday. George W. Tyler conducted the examinations on behalf of the government today as he did yesterday and while he questioned every one as to their affiliation with the I. W. W. organization each man disavowed the organization and expressed his disapproval of it. All those who passed declared their willingness at any time to be prepared to go to war in defense of the Stars and Stripes.

The following is a list of the 13 who were given their citizenship papers today: James Philip Campbell, Charles McDermott, John Norrard, John Jennings, Axel Waldemar Tillman, James Conboy, Richard Hurnblad, Daniel Flannery, George Upton Hill, Nelson Jensen Dinsington, Ferdinand Hagan, William Kent and Patrick McLaughlin.

There was one German and one Austrian who had their applications for papers continued until after the war.

Know Country's History.

The great majority of those who were examined this morning showed a much better knowledge of the history of the country and the principles of government than usual. Daniel Flannery easily passed the best examination of any in the class, answering every question propounded by the examiner with promptness and correctness. He was complimented by the judge. The remainder of those whose names appeared on the calendar either had their cases continued until November through lack of study of the constitution or want of evidence as to the time and place of landing in the country.

McGinn Arrested.

John McGinn, who yesterday appeared for examination and whose case was continued until November in order to give him an opportunity to ascertain his correct age, has been arrested by the federal authorities and admitted to jail by United States Commissioner L. M. Van Etten. McGinn in making his application for his first and second papers gave his age as would bring him under the draft, although he admitted that he did not register. He told the court that he made a mistake in filling in his age in the first and second petitions for citizenship. John Willoughby, who also did the same thing, has not yet been arrested, although the officers are looking for him.

TRIES TO KILL HIS WIFE AND ENDS HIS OWN LIFE

a revolver from his pocket and leveled it on her. Braden sprang towards Moyle and was struck in the shoulder by a bullet intended for the woman. Moyle then fired two more shots at the woman, one striking her in the breast and the other in the abdomen. While Braden and Moyle struggled for possession of the gun, Mrs. Moyle made her way from the house. Moyle threw himself free from Braden, sought his wife in the yard and, failing to find her, went back to the door of the house, where he fired two shots into his own body.

Police were called by neighbors who heard the shooting. Mrs. Moyle and Braden were hurried to the Emergency hospital, Braden leaving for his home after having his wound dressed. Coroner Lane took possession of Moyle's body and ordered it removed to an undertaking establishment.

Babe Was Asleep.

The Moyles were married three years ago in Butte and have a boy two years old. Some time ago the family troubles developed to such an extent that Moyle was arrested on a charge preferred by his wife. He was dismissed in police court. Later he was arrested on a charge of threatening the life of his wife, a charge which still was pending at the time of the shooting. Mrs. Moyle left her husband about three weeks ago, securing employment in South Butte and renting a room with the Braden family. Her baby was asleep in the Braden home at the time of the shooting. Moyle was 27 years old, his wife 24.

Mrs. Moyle, recovering rapidly from the effects of her wounds, was able to talk at the Emergency hospital today. She was unwilling to talk of the family troubles but admitted that her husband had been insanely jealous, although he never blamed her with a specific act of wrong doing. The fact that she left him and went to work to support her child is held to be the reason for the fit of jealousy that led to the shooting. Mrs. Moyle is well known in Butte, where she has always held general respect and esteem.

Due to Family Troubles.

Relatives of Moyle stated today that they believed the tragedy was due solely to family troubles and not to any wrongdoing with others on the part of his wife. Mr. W. F. Williams, a brother-in-law of Moyle, today stated that all members of Moyle's family had deepest respect for both the young man and his wife but that their domestic troubles had been taken to many of their friends and acquaintances and this had caused only greater feeling of resentment.

It is understood that Moyle objected to his wife earning her own living and frequently sought to have her discharged from her employment. No charge of infidelity against the wife or involving those persons named in the letter he left was made by Moyle. Moyle is survived by his mother, Mrs. Salina Moyle, who lives with her daughter, Mrs. W. F. Williams; by a brother, E. J. Moyle, and by two other sisters, Mrs. James Whalen and Mrs. Salina Paulk. His father has been dead about 12 years. His mother, who is 65 years old, is prostrated by the shock of the tragedy.

The funeral of William Moyle will be held from the residence of his brother-in-law, W. F. Williams, 225 South Arizona street, Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Coroner Lane will hold an inquest the first part of next week.
