ARMY CAMP RULES NOW APPLY TO NAVAL CAMPS

Washington, Oct. 5.—All rules pertaining to the regulation of army cantonment camps and vicinity in order to protect the soldiers from vice were extended to naval training camps in a bill adopted today by the senate. The senate also passed bills authorizing the paying of gratuity to the widows or children of enlisted men losing their lives while serving on active duty in the present war and the compensating of sailors and property lost while in service. The bills have already been passed by the house and now go to the president for his signature.

EMPLOYEES NOT TO LOSE PLACES

Clerks and Carriers in Army Will Be Promoted Automatically.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Oct. 5.—Clerks and carriers in the postal service in Montana and the other states, who have enlisted or have been drafted for military duty, may rest assured not only that their places in the postal service will be waiting for them when they come back, but that while they are away they will receive automatic promotions the same as if they were at home.

This information as to Uncle Sam's generous attitude toward patriotic postal employees is contained in a letter which Senator Pomeroy has received from Walter W. Warwick, comptroller of the treasury.

The law governing automatic promotions says: "Clerks in offices of the first and second class shall be divided into six grades, as follows: First grade, salary \$600; second grade, salary \$580; third grade, salary \$560; fourth grade, salary \$540; fifth grade, salary \$520; sixth grade, salary \$500. Clerks at first-class offices shall be promoted successively to the fifth grade and clerks at second-class offices shall be promoted successively to the fourth grade. After June 30, 1918, the first grade for clerks shall be abolished and appointments shall be made to the second grade, salary \$600. All promotions of clerks shall be made at the beginning of the quarter following the expiration of a year's service in the next lower grade."

Another act, approved July 23, 1916, says: "Any postal employee who has entered the military service of the United States or who shall hereafter enter it shall, upon being honorably discharged therefrom, be permitted to resume the position in the postal department which he left to enter such military service."

Comptroller Warwick, in interpreting these acts, has written to Postmaster General Burleson as follows: "The provision in the act of July 23, 1916, contemplates, I think, a continuation on the rolls rather than a discharge and reinstatement. That this is the construction placed upon the law by the department is evidenced by the expressed intention to grant to the employee indefinite leave of absence. I think it was the intent and purpose of this provision that service with the military forces should not break the continuity of a postal employee's service as such, and that upon the resumption of his postal duties he should be in the same status as though his military service had been postal service."

"You are advised, therefore, that so long as these employees are continued on the rolls under authority of law they must be treated as in the service within the meaning of the law relating to automatic promotions, regardless of the fact that they are on leave of absence without pay."

BIG AREAS OPENED TO ENTRY IN OREGON

Washington, Oct. 5.—Proclamations have been signed by the president restoring to homestead entry, 6,842 acres of land in the Walla Walla national forest, Walla Walla county, Oregon, and about 28,438 acres in the Fremont national forest, Lake and Klamath counties, Oregon. The tracts will be subject to the homestead laws after 9 a. m., Nov. 15, and to settlement and other forms of disposition on and after Nov. 22.

BOARD VETOES PLAN FOR 6-CENT CAR FARE

Salem, Ore., Oct. 5.—The Oregon state public service commission today denied to the Portland Railway, Light and Power company permission to increase the fare on its urban car lines in Portland to 6 cents. The company had announced that the granting of a pending petition from employees for an advance in wages depended on the proposal to increase the fare.

TO PROTECT HOMESTEADS OF MEN IN THE SERVICE

Washington, Oct. 5.—Senator Kingsland, which would prevent men absent on account of military service from having their entries in public lands forfeited while away was passed today by the senate and was sent to the house.

PASS BILL FOR FOREIGN SHIPS IN COAST TRADE

Washington, Oct. 5.—The administration bill permitting foreign vessels in the coastwise trade except to Alaska, during the war and for 120 days thereafter, was unanimously passed today by the senate. It now goes to the president.

SCOUTS TO SUBSCRIBE TO PLEDGE OF LOYALTY

Will Be Mustered in Sunday Morning on Cinder Track West of City.

The Butte regiment of Naval and Marine Scouts will take the pledge of allegiance to the colors next Sunday morning on the cinder track at the School of Mines. Almost 400 boys have joined the new Scout orders in Butte. The boys were notified after their drill last night that the next meeting will be Sunday morning. The pledge does not bind the boys to military service in any form. Rather, it binds them to become patriotic citizens, each willing to do his share for the country. But, on the other hand, the boys are to be given military training that will be valuable to both them and the nation when they become men.

The pledge will be read to the boys Sunday by Malcolm Gillis. Other business men and citizens will probably make short talks to the boys. The entire regiment will march in the parade in honor of drafted men Sunday night. TO DENY MAILS TO PUBLICATIONS

Seditious Journals Not to Be Distributed as Mail Matter.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Oct. 5.—"I have every intention," said Postmaster General Burleson, "of denying the use of the mails to any newspaper or other publication that is disloyal to the country."

Those that the trading with the enemy bill has been signed by the president the postmaster general will begin to bear down on all disloyal newspapers. The legislation not only permits the postoffice department to exercise large powers in denying the use of the mails to seditious publications, but requires foreign language newspapers to submit to their local postmasters English translations of all matter they print relating to the conduct of the war or the foreign policies of the government in respect to the war.

These translations are required to be forwarded by the local postmasters to the postmaster general in Washington, who will promptly shut down the mails on any paper printing improper matter. Severe penalties are provided in cases where false or incomplete translations are found to have been submitted.

The editors and publishers of such papers as Hull and the Masses, which already have been excluded from the mails under the old law, will no longer find it possible to send copies of their papers out by express, as the new law provides severe penalties for express companies undertaking to transport publications excluded from the mails.

The new law further provides for the first time authority to exercise a censorship of the mails. For the present, however, the intention of the postoffice department is to censor only such mails as go over the border into Mexico.

No attempt will be made at this time to censor domestic mails nor those that go across the Atlantic to Europe, reliance being placed in the elaborate British censorship to prevent any mails of an improper character getting to Germany in that way. Should the British system fail to work in this regard, however, it is probable that the American government will apply a strict censorship of its own to all outgoing mails.

FLANDERS PEOPLE ARE FINED FOR GIVING FOOD TO BRITISH PRISONERS

Have, Oct. 4.—A Belgian official communication today says: "Zele, in eastern Flanders, has been fined 80,000 marks for the giving of food and cigarettes to passing English prisoners. Furthermore, all houses in the district are to be searched for food and cigarettes, and if any are found, the owners are to be fined 100 marks."

MEDIUM FOUND OUT.

Portland, Ore.—The desire to tell a friend of the possession of a large sum of money and a visit to a "spiritualist" caused the arrest of Louise Cernoha and her husband Jack, charged with the robbery of \$1,745 from the home of Mrs. Mary Pernich, 113 Glisan street, on Aug. 23. She visited a "medium," and during the "reading" was told to return the money to the rightful owner.

She became greatly excited and, fearing that the "spiritualist" was possessed with unearthly power, she fled from the house. The woman was unaware that she had been trapped into the "reading" by "City Detectives Leonard, Snow, J. Moloney and Coleman. The money was found buried in the cellar of the Cernohas' home, at 127 Eleventh street.

AUSTRALIAN SHIPS MAY BE SEIZED

Melbourne, Australia.—The British government has been in communication with the Australian government with a view of requisitioning all available shipping in Australian waters for the transport of cargoes overseas. Already the interstate and coastal trade has contributed about \$2,000,000 tons of shipping, but to be now forthcoming.

Among other things it is proposed that the large lighters employed at the principal Australian ports should be loaded with Australian commodities and towed to South Africa, where the cargoes could be discharged into time and tonnage.
