**STATE LOSES IN PALM CAFE CASE**

Permanent Injunction Against Resort is Denied by Judge Lynch.

The application to make the injunction permanent in the case of the State ex rel Joseph B. Jackson against Dan Tacey and others was dismissed this morning by Judge J. J. Lynch on the ground that the proper party had not been made a defendant in the matter of conducting the Palm Cafe case. The motion for the permanent injunction was heard before Judge Lynch a couple of weeks ago and taken under advisement.

In giving his decision dismissing the motion the judge said that the county attorney was to be highly commended for taking steps to close the notorious place, but the preponderance of the evidence was to the effect that "Doc" Borst was the man who conducted the cafe and his name was not mentioned in the suit. It was further shown that Wade and Wilson, mentioned as defendants, had nothing to do with the cafe, but simply owned the season in the Southern hotel building. The cafe has been closed since the issuance of the temporary injunction and should it be reopened under old conditions a new suit will have to be commenced to close it up again.

On motion of Attorney L. P. Donovan seven suits commenced against directors of the state Savings bank against T. R. Carson and others, the default was ordered entered on the part of Abe Cohen, one of the defendants.

The suit of J. W. Williams against the Butte Miner company and others was transferred to department two, a disqualifying affidavit having been filed against Judge Lynch.

**800 ARTILLERYMEN ARRIVE IN BUTTE**

Regular Army Troops Will Relieve Montana Guards on Duty Here.

About 800 coast artillerymen of the regular army, who have been stationed in the state of Washington, under command of Major Reeves, arrived in Butte Saturday night and will relieve Companies F and K, federalized soldiers from the Montana national guard, who have been doing guard duty in Butte this summer and fall.

Officers in command of the artillerymen refuse to explain the presence of so large a number of soldiers in Butte, but the men themselves believe that they will be distributed at different points throughout the state for guard duty. The number that will remain in Butte permanently is not known. The artillerymen at present are quartered in their special train.

make 22 1/2 per cent of that county's quota. Rosebud and Sweet Grass counties are the lowest, although they each have a certification of 100 per cent.

**Await Final Orders.**

The two local boards are waiting for the final orders that will name the date of entrainment of the last contingent of troops. In this last contingent the city will send approximately 170 men, the county 112. It is possible that the sending of slackers to the camp this week may cut down the total number to be included in the third contingent. Each day a few men who have failed to report for examination show up at the courthouse or city hall with good excuses. These men are being sent each evening to Camp Lewis.

D. C. Marriot, whose name has been published among those failing to appear for examination, proved yesterday he did not come in for examination. His excuse was acceptable, he was examined at once, and will leave tonight for Camp Lewis.

**Ratio of Men Secured.**

The end of the work under the first draft will show Butte and Silver Bow county in an unique position in the nation. While the army authorities at first decided that the quotas could be raised from a call of twice the number of the quota, it has been found necessary in this city and county to call a much larger number of men. The county has obtained approximately one conscript from each three examined, the city one from each five examined. The exclusion of aliens from the draft made the work harder. It has been figured that 28 per cent of the registered men of Butte are aliens.

The work done by the city exemption board of Butte will probably receive national recognition. This board has handled a larger number of registered men than any other local in the United States, it has faced a percentage of aliens probably greater than in any other locality of the country, and it has been forced to cope with a number of slackers and deserters, although Butte stands no worse than the rest of the country as a whole in respect to this class of men. The members of the city board have given practically their whole time to the government since registration day on June 5, and from the beginning of the draft have worked long and steady hours to keep Butte's draft work up to the minute.
