FOUR UNIONS SETTLE WAGES

Tinners, Drug Clerks, Stage
Hands and Butchers Are
Now All Satisfied.

Members of the Butte Tinners' union and representatives of the tinner employers went into conference in the offices of the Silver Bow Employers' association this afternoon at 3 o'clock in an endeavor to adjust the differences between the employers and the members of the union.

The tinners demanded a dollar per day increase several weeks ago. As the established wage is \$7 the demand, if granted, would have placed it at \$8. The demand, however, was refused and the tinners have since been on strike. It is said the tinners have agreed to accept the employers' offer to compromise on \$7.50 per day, but some of the working rules remain to be untangled.

Drug Clerks' New Wage.
It was announced this afternoon that the drug clerks and druggists have reached an agreement after a lengthy session in the employers' association headquarters, the clerks accepting the offer of the employers of a 50-cent per day advance. This is in line with the other adjustments between Butte unions and the employers' association this season. The demand of the drug clerks was for \$3.50. The former wage was \$3.00 per week. Under the final agreement the new scale for drug clerks is \$3.50 per week.

Stage Hands Satisfied.
Another conference held in the employers' association offices today was that between the stage hands and their employers. A new arrangement for stage hands in houses running five days in the week was decided upon and both sides announced it a satisfactory adjustment.

Four Unions Settle Up.
As the butchers' strike was settled about a week ago, this makes four satisfactory adjustments reached in conferences between departments of the employers' association and the unions within a week. The settlements have been made on the basis of a 50-cent advance. The painters' union is the only union in Butte which has refused to either compromise or arbitrate this year, and because of this stand of the painters the situation there is a deadlock and may remain this way all winter.



Surety of \$174,000 Will Be Offered in District Court on Behalf of Z. Savichevich, Charged With Slaying I. W. W. Assailant.

Pending his trial on a charge of killing Verner Nelson, an I. W. W. leader, whom he shot Oct. 4, after Nelson had called him a "scab" and assaulted him for working in the mines, Zeko Savichevich will this afternoon seek his release from Judge Dwyer on the bond of \$174,000. The bond,

first degree was filed by County Attorney Jackson against Savichevich last Monday. This afternoon Attorney McCaffery presented his bond to the court and asked for the release of the prisoner. After the court looked over the list of the bondsmen an order to release Savichevich was issued. The testimony adduced at the coroner's inquest showed that Savichevich, a Serbian, had been molested repeatedly by alleged I. W. W. sympathizers for his insistence upon working. Eleven days ago he walked into the Little Queen Restaurant at 325 South Arizona street, as was his habit every afternoon, to eat dinner. While going into the cafe he was accosted by Verner Nelson, who had taken a prominent part in the local I. W. W. movement, and Earl Harley. The two attempted to start an argument with Savichevich.
