## SENIORITY RULE LAID ASIDE IN THE ARMY

Promotions Will Be Made According to Merit.  
Washington, Oct. 19.—The historic seniority rule for army promotions was finally set aside today to govern promotions in the national army and national guard.  
Officers of either the regulars, the national or the national army are held to be equally eligible for temporary appointment or promotion, which must be based solely on demonstrated fitness without regard to seniority.  
The new regulations make officers interchangeable within their arms and sides in the service, and the list of reserve corps second lieutenants of the regular army is also made available for appointment of men in that grade to the other branches. Stress is laid on the desirability of promoting men in the unit in which a vacancy occurs where this is advisable. In naming second lieutenants, commanders may select non-commissioned officers or officers of the reserve corps as they see best.

## MINERS STRIKE CONFERENCE IS ON IN PORTLAND

Portland, Ore., Oct. 19.—Final conferences between the federal wage adjustment board and international officers of the unions involved, employers and employees were held today in an effort to effect a temporary settlement of the shipyard strike here before the federal board leaves at 8 o'clock tonight for San Francisco. A determined attempt to reach an agreement will be made in the meantime.  
The committee of four, named to select an adjuster, probably will decide on one today.

## LOUISIANA BAD MAN PAYS DEATH PENALTY

Baton Rouge, La., Oct. 19.—Helaire Carriere, Louisiana "bad man," was hanged today in the state penitentiary here for the murder of Sheriff Swords last July. Run down in the cane brakes after a sensational man-hunt of weeks, Carriere resisted his execution to the last moment, even to the extent of attempting suicide in his cell last night by slashing his throat with a safety razor blade.

# GERMAN COMMENT UPON THE EXPOSE OF BOLO'S WORK

Newspaper Declares One Telegram in Lansing's Expose is False.

Amsterdam, Oct. 19.—Count von Bernstorff did not know Bolo Pasha, the Frenchman held as a spy in France, according to the Tageblatt. The newspaper says:  
"In connection with the Bolo Pasha episode and the disclosures of Secretary Lansing concerning the part alleged to have been played by Ambassador von Bernstorff and former Secretary von Jagow, we are informed by a competent source that the personality of Bolo Pasha was not known to von Bernstorff at Washington, inasmuch as the ambassador did not have recourse to sources in the United States which might have been at the disposal of official quarters here. It is also established that the name of Bolo Pasha was never made known to von Bernstorff and his banker intermediaries did not mention him. Consequently the passage in the alleged telegram published by Secretary Lansing in which von Jagow asked von Bernstorff 'What is new about Bolo?' is false."  
"This warrants the obvious deduction regarding the trustworthiness of other details in this telegram."  
The Tagliche Rundschau says that the mention of Bolo's name in the von Jagow dispatch is "another forgery of Secretary Lansing's for transparent purposes."

## WHY GERMANY WILL NOT MAKE DEFINITE PEACE STATEMENT

Copenhagen, Oct. 19.—The key to the policy of the German government in refusing to make any definite statement of peace terms is furnished by Herr Hoch, a socialist member of the reichstag. German newspapers report that the deputy told yesterday how Dr. von Bothmann-Hollweg, before his retirement as imperial chancellor, declared to the socialist members of the reichstag that as chancellor he could not commit himself, but must pull out in the peace negotiations whatever could be obtained for Germany.  
Herr Hoch cited this as proof of the ambiguous game the government is playing with its various indefinite peace declarations.

## MINE WORKERS LEADERS URGE MEN TO RETURN

35 Kansas coal mines are idle today because of a delay in the transmission of the message of the district president announcing the strike called for this morning had been deferred. Five other mines are idle because of a scarcity of coal carts.

## MANY INDIANA MINERS STILL OUT

Terre Haute, Ind., Oct. 19.—For the second time many coal miners in this section of the state failed to go to the mines today, after having agreed to return to work at mass meetings. It is estimated that practically 5,000 miners are idle. Secretary P. H. Penna of the Indiana Coal Operators said he believed the mines will operate Monday.

Minneapolis, \$45,000,000; Atlanta, \$20,000,000; Dallas, \$15,000,000.  
"Total official returns from the 12 federal reserve banks stand at \$827,000,000, but this figure probably will be greatly increased the next few days by additional reports from outside banks. Many reports, it has been ascertained, contain only the total of subscriptions as actually filed with the reserve banks.  
"The reserve banks have been asked to obtain the total from all the banks in their districts and forward them to the treasury."

## MILLION DOLLAR BLOCK OF LIBERTY BONDS SOLD ON THE STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 19.—A million-dollar block of Liberty loan bonds changed hands on the stock market today at 99 7/8. This is the largest single transaction in the bonds since they were put on the market.  
New York, Oct. 19.—An overnight gain of more than \$21,000,000 brought the total Liberty loan subscriptions in the New York federal reserve district up to \$566,300,000; it was announced at noon today by the committee.  
The German submarine brought from England was exhibited in Central park today. It bore a sign "U-Boy-A-Bond." Ten million was added this afternoon by a subscription from Kuhn, Loeb & Co.

Buck, who is 27 years old, has been in Canada since last January, in the employ of the British-American Nickel corporation at Nickelton, Ontario.  
"I'm willing to fight for Uncle Sam, but I'd hate to be drafted here," said young Buck. His wishes probably will be granted, as his case probably will come under a treaty which will be signed by the United States and Great Britain in the near future providing for an exchange of Canadian and American subjects within the draft ages.

# MAKES READY TO DELIVER BONDS

Daily Bank Receives Larger Denominations—To Remain Open Three Nights.

will be received by the bank tomorrow morning, according to a telegram received today from the federal reserve bank at Minneapolis. The 3 1/2 per cent Liberty loan bonds taken through the Daily bank will be ready for delivery after Monday and subscribers may secure them by calling at the bank.  
Because of the press of business incident to the taking of subscriptions for the second Liberty loan, it is suggested that subscribers wait until the campaign for that loan ends before calling for their bonds of the first issue.  
"It would be a favor the bank would appreciate," said Charles J. Kelly, president of the Daily Bank and Trust company, today, "if subscribers would wait until after the subscriptions are closed for the second issue of Liberty loan bonds before calling for their bonds of the first issue. In this connection I might add that we have received word from the federal reserve bank that all of the 4 per cent bonds—that is, the bonds of the second Liberty loan—will be ready for delivery upon payment in full by the subscribers."  
The Daily bank will be open from 7 to 9 o'clock on the evenings of Saturday, Monday and Tuesday to receive subscriptions for the second Liberty loan.  
Mr. Kelly, who is chairman of the committee in charge of the Liberty loan campaign in this district, said today that the work was progressing satisfactorily.  
"From the reports we have received," he added, "we are greatly encouraged at the outlook. In all the counties included in this district there have been a great number of subscribers and, while their subscriptions are mostly for comparatively small amounts, the aggregate, we believe, will be satisfactory."
