HOLD PROPERTY
ALIEN ENEMIES

Mitchel Palmer, Former
Congressman, Named to
Important Post.

Washington, Oct. 19.—A. Mitchel Palmer, of Baltimore, Pa., former representative in congress, was today appointed alien property custodian under the new law. Palmer and whose powers are defined by the president's proclamation putting it in effect, will act as trustee of all enemy property within the United States or issue licenses exempting any person from the transfer to him of any property held for or any person to an enemy or an enemy ally any person holding such property may transfer the money to the person with his consent.

To End of War.
The alien property custodian will hold such property or money until the end of the war and then deal with it as he may direct. All funds or money taken by the custodian will be invested in Liberty bonds and in that form.

Palmer until his retirement from congress was one of the administrative spokesmen in the house. He came to be nominated for the vice presidency at the Baltimore convention which nominated President Wilson and was the president's choice for secretary of war, in his first cabinet, declined the portfolio because he is a Quaker.

DO BETTER
WORK AT MOSCOW

Washington, Oct. 19.—Russian officials here had no dispatches today on the removal of the Russian provisional government from Petrograd to Moscow, but said that the plan of moving the seat of government, conceived some time ago, undoubtedly had been hastened by the German advance in the Baltic territory. Ever since the removal of the capital was first discussed, Russian officials here have reiterated that the Kerensky government felt it could not work with fewer hampering influences in Moscow than in Petrograd, which is the center of the opposition. The German advance, Russian officials here say, undoubtedly has strengthened the extreme radicals in the council of soldiers and workmen's delegates.

CRITICISE BRITISH
FLEET FOR FAILING TO
OPPOSE THE GERMANS

London, Oct. 19.—The Daily Mail condemns what it calls the failure of the British fleet to prevent the German fleet from becoming master of the Gulf of Riga and demands that "the admiralty make an explanation of this humiliating display in the Baltic." Resulting in the Baltic success of British submarines against the Germans in 1915, the newspaper adds: "The Germans have accomplished all they were prevented from achieving in 1915 and they have done so without a single blow being struck at them by any arm of the British navy, a navy far stronger than it was two years ago and recently reinforced by the addition of the American fleet."

THEIR COUNTRY'S CAWS.

A Berlin correspondent said in Baltimore in a lecture on the blockade: "The Germans are suffering from our blockade more than they'd have us think. There's a real dearth of foodstuffs, and there's a real pest of profiteers." "I think of it—the Germans are now eating crow! More than that, the profiteers have cornered the crows of Germany, so that the government has had to fix crow prices, which range, I believe, from 60 and 85 cents, according to the weight and age of the bird." "But imagine it! Cornering crow! That is no way to help our country's caws!"
