Now add six apricots, canned, sliced thin. Bake for one hour and a half in a moderate oven. Garnish with sliced apricots and serve with sauce made from the juice of the apricots.

POHL HEARING TO COME IN NOVEMBER

Immigration Inspector Returns From Important Trip to Salt Lake.

Immigration Inspector Thomas Topping returned to Butte today from Salt Lake, where he has been investigating certain angles of the case of Carl Pohl, native Prussian, who is interned in Butte and about whose name have been circulated reports of alleged sensational German agency workings in Butte. While making none of his findings public, it was intimated by the immigration inspector and the district attorney's force that important and connecting statements have been obtained in Salt Lake in reference to Pohl's activities in Butte during the past seven months.

As nearly as could be learned today, Inspector Topping will set the hearing in Pohl's case, on immigration warrant, for the middle of November. Should Pohl be convicted under the immigration warrant, he may be deported to Canada, where he has taken out citizenship papers. Should the prosecution fail in the immigration case Pohl will be interned during the period of the war in this country.

"The story of Pohl's alleged activities will come out at his hearing in November before the immigration inspector," was the statement given out from the district attorney's office today. "Our case is nearly complete and as soon as Mr. Topping sets the date of the hearing we will be ready."

"The hearing will be in Butte," said the immigration inspector today.

their patrons. Warehouses will be classified as public or private and those storing goods on their own account as well as for the public will be required to take out also dealers' licenses.

All warehouses will be required to file schedules of their rates with the food administration.

"The purpose of the regulations," it was said by the food administration today, "is to strengthen the legitimate warehouse men by bringing the operations of all storage concerns out into the open and preventing those who patronize the warehouses from taking advantage of the opportunities for speculation. It is not believed that the practices aimed at are general, but rather that they have been indulged in only by the few who have abused the system."

Attractive Menus.
One thing the restaurant chefs of Butte demonstrated today, and that is that an attractive menu can be arranged without the use of meat. So attractive were many of these menus that patrons failed to note the absence of meats.

Vegetable dinners were called for frequently today. While most of the restaurants had turkey, chicken, liver, sweetbreads, brains and other meat products which are not shipped, the people of Butte wanted to observe the day by eliminating meat completely and confined their meals to vegetables. Not a few, however, called for fish, of which there was a great variety, while lovers of lobster and oysters were well cared for.

Sidestepping Meat.
An idea of how one well known restaurant sidestepped meat can be gathered from the following entrees on the menu: Chicken pot pie, turkey giblet saute, vegetarian dinner, salmi of duck, Montana squab, sweetbreads, warran oysters, calves liver, calves brains, baked beans, lobster, spring chicken, sardines, baked halibut, turkey patties and chicken liver omelet.

All of the leading hotel men of the city were enthusiastic over the manner in which their patrons observed the day.
