## WESTERN DIVISION OF MARINES STILL LEADS

### Sergeant Speer of Butte Receives Recruiting Figures for September.

Marine recruiting figures for September show that the western recruiting division, of which Butte is a part, led the rest of the nation in percentage of recruits to population for that month. From the western division alone the marine corps obtained 161 recruits during the month. In pointing out the good record made in the west in recruiting, Sergeant Speer says that no state has been more patriotic in sending men than Montana, and no city more ready than Butte. Of the coast cities, the only ones to beat the recruiting record of Butte were San Francisco, Sacramento, Portland and Seattle. Butte led many cities, twice its population, in recruiting. "I believe that the October record will be even better," said Sergeant Speer yesterday. "There are plenty of openings now in the marine corps. A number of men seem laboring under the impression that the marine corps recruiting has been stopped. The office was closed for a short time, but we are ready to take men once more."

## WEATHER HALTS WORK ON THOMPSON PARK ARCH

### Framework Will Be Thrown Up So Work Can Be Completed Next Spring.

On account of last week's snow and the approach of the winter, the arch at the entrance to Thompson park will not be completed until next spring. It was the intention of the playgrounds committee to have the work finished before the cold weather set in. On account of weather conditions, it is impossible to do the cement work on the arch satisfactorily at this time.

## PRESIDENT TELLS HOW PRONOUNCE CANTONMENT


Washington, D. C., Nov. 2.—President Wilson pronounces it "can-tun-ment," accent on the first syllable, and so does Secretary of War Newton D. Baker. The other war department officials pronounce it "can-ton-ment," accent on the second syllable, because they got it started that way and can't stop, though they know it is not the preferred pronunciation. Dr. Theodore W. Hunt, professor of English at Princeton, approves "can-ton-ment" with the accent on the second syllable and the "n" as in the word bond. The president and Secretary Baker are supported by the Century, Webster's, Worcester's and Fernald's 1917 edition of the Comprehensive Standard Dictionary, while Sir James A. H. Murray's New English Dictionary of Oxford University and the Imperial and Stormont's Dictionary side with Dr. Hunt. Nothing but current usage justifies "can-ton-ment," in spite of the fact that 50 per cent of the United States army and government officials at Washington are pronouncing it that way.

## RUSS FACE WAR TO DEATH NEW CIVIL STRIFE COMING

Fullman, Wash.—A war to the death between the extremists and the military in Russia is inevitable this winter. The military party probably will win and assume control of the republic. Fighting will cease along the Russian front and wholesale desertions from the army will take place. Thousands upon thousands of starving refugees will flock to the cities where other starving thousands will meet them. The result will be a new revolution. Kerensky is weak. He wobbles and hesitates. His chance is passing. He is doomed. Kerensky's sins are those of omission. Kerensky, now in jail, really is the strong man of Russia. He stands for centralization and discipline. The extremists are in control of Russia, with "decentralization" as their cry. Unconsciously they are driving their country right back into the hands of autocracy, although a return of the czar is an impossibility. It is an even chance that Russia will reconstruct herself along centralized lines with an efficient, disciplined, fighting army by next spring. These are the real conditions in Russia today as told here for the first time by Prof. Frank C. Golder of Washington State college, just back from Petrograd. Professor Golder early this year went to Russia for the National Geographic society and the Carnegie institute. A trained observer, he arrived in Petrograd five days before the outbreak of the revolution. He has brought back to the United States the first personal message from Alexander Kerensky, Russia's premier, to the American people and other news heretofore withheld. Just before leaving Petrograd, Golder asked Kerensky, "What message may I carry back to my people?" His voice strained with emotion, Kerensky made an impassioned plea for American faith in the Russian republic—an appeal unrecanted by any official and for the first time published herewith. Professor Golder said: "The Russian revolution, it is practically certain, was deliberately started by the autocracy, and this is why: "Russia was ripe for revolution, following this war. Public sentiment had crystallized into the belief that it was inevitable. The government knew this, too, and knew that it stood a good chance of succeeding. "By flooding the factories with agitators the autocracy sought to stir up revolt and then crush it with such ferocity that the people would be terrorized for years. "But autocracy lost control when the army joined the revolutionists. "Germany, which was as surprised as anyone at the turn of affairs, at once began working to paralyze the Russian armies. She gathered hundreds of nihilists and anarchists banished by the old Russian autocracy and living in Sweden, Denmark and Switzerland. "Germany rushed these agitators across country in special trains with right of way over everything else, sifting them into the Russian army. "They preached this to the Russian soldiers: "This is a capitalist's war. You are not interested. Why should you fight your German brothers? Lay down your arms and demand peace. "The propaganda succeeded, and Russian army resistance ceased. "SCOUTS MEET TONIGHT. ## AMERICA ONLY NATION THAT RUSSIA TRUSTS IS MESSAGE OF KERENSKY


