### DENY REPORTS THAT TRAIN WAS ATTACKED

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 5.—Western Pacific railroad officials here denied today reports that a troop train on that road was attacked early Sunday morning in Feather River canyon, 50 miles from Marysville, Cal. The Western Pacific train dispatcher here said no troop trains were being operated in that vicinity at the time the alleged attack was reported to have occurred.

According to advices from Marysville the men boarded the train and cut it in two before they were beaten off by soldiers armed with sticks.

## SALMONSON IS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

### Accused of Causing Death of Erick Turnquist From Pen Knife Wounds.

The trial of Isaac Salmonson for the murder of Erick Turnquist on the evening of Aug. 8 last at 14 South Wyoming street was commenced this morning before Judge Dwyer. County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson and Deputy County Attorneys Frank L. Riley and T. E. Downey appeared for the prosecution and Attorneys Joseph M. Griffin and Dan T. Malloy for the defendant. The indications are that the case will consume three days, as when the noon adjournment hour arrived neither the defendant nor the state had reached the point to exercise challenges.

When the case was called Judge Dwyer asked the attorneys to get along as expeditiously as possible, avoiding unnecessary questions and delays.

Salmonson and Turnquist lived in the same house at 14 South Wyoming street. On the evening of Aug. 8, according to the information in the possession of the county attorney's office, Salmonson and his son, Ernest, were sitting in the kitchen of their part of the house, the former being engaged with a penknife paring his finger nails. Turnquist is said to have entered the kitchen for the purpose of getting some water. Some words were exchanged between the two men with the result that a fight followed during which Salmonson is alleged to have stabbed Turnquist with his knife several times. The wounded man was rushed to the emergency hospital where he died within a few minutes after being brought in.

## MRS. BELMONT INSPECTS RED CROSS WORK ABROAD

### She Visits the Hospitals and American Canteens in France.

American Training Camp in France, Sunday, Nov. 4.—(By the associated press.)—Mrs. August Belmont is touring eastern France and other sections where American workers are gathering material for the spring Red Cross campaign in the United States. With her husband and others interested in Red Cross activities, she motored from Paris to headquarters and later inspected the base hospitals.

At many places Mrs. Belmont stopped her car along the roadside where she was the object of much interest to the soldiers. She was the first American woman many of the men had seen since they left the United States. Mrs. Belmont visited—where she saw damage caused by bombs and where the families are now being cared for by the Red Cross. She also visited the American canteen at— and expects to enter them if the bombardment is not too heavy.

The primary purpose of Mrs. Belmont's visit is to secure first-hand information in order that the people of the United States may know what the Red Cross is doing.

## CAMPANELLO'S BOND IS FIXED AT \$10,000

Nick Campanello appeared before Judge Dwyer this morning and was arraigned on a statutory offense. He will appear for plea next Saturday. The defendant is represented by Attorney A. B. Melzner, and he asked the court to fix a reasonable bond, as the man had a family and small children and it was desirable that he should get out and work. The bond was fixed at \$10,000.

William Forsyth, charged with obtaining money by means of a worthless check and two prior convictions, was arraigned and his plea fixed for next Saturday. Attorney Dan T. Malloy appears for the defendant.

## ROTTERING TO APPEAR BEFORE SUPREME COURT

Chief Deputy County Attorney N. A. Rottering left for Helena this afternoon, where he appears in the supreme court tomorrow in the appeal case of Sherman Powell, under sentence of death. The appeal of Frank Fisher and John O'Neill, whose true name is said to be Gullich, will be heard Wednesday. The two men are under sentence of death for murder.
