NEW RATE PLANS INVOLVE INCREASE IN TRANSCONTINENTALS

Washington, Nov. 12.—Formal application to make the rate increases caused by the rate increases ordered in the intermountain rate case was presented by the railroads today to the interstate commerce commission. Transcontinental rates to Pacific coast terminals would be increased. In general, present rates from the Missouri river to intermediate points would be retained and rates from territories east of the Missouri river would be increased slightly by addition of differentials to the Missouri river rates. Rates to Pacific coast points would be increased from 5 to 15 cents more than rates to intermediate points. Other rate changes also are contemplated.

SIXTY-FIVE PER CENT OF HOMES OWN LIBERTY BONDS

Remarkable Record Was Made by the Ninth Federal Reserve District, of Which Montana is a Part. Five Subscriptions in This State of More Than \$200,000 Each. There Were 70,383 Liberty Bond Buyers in Montana.

Liberty bonds of the second issue have gone into 65 per cent of the homes of the Ninth Federal Reserve district, which includes Montana, a total of 621,770 individual subscriptions being rolled up in the recent campaign, according to a statement received in Butte today from John H. Rich of Minneapolis, chairman of the district bank board. The statement gives totals by states and shows that Montana furnished 70,383 bond buyers who subscribed \$19,751,999. This gives the Montana State an over-subscription of \$4,751,999.

The statement shows that \$20,811 subscribers took bonds in amounts from \$50 up to \$10,000, for a total of \$89,471,600, the other 959 subscriptions being for larger amounts totalling \$41,481,000. Of 27 subscriptions over \$200,000, Minnesota furnished 20, Montana 5, South Dakota 1 and upper Michigan 1. All the states exceeded their quotas. Minnesota had been expected to raise \$55,000,000, and raised nearly \$80,000,000. North Dakota, given \$6,000,000 to raise, made it over \$10,000,000, and South Dakota, with a \$10,000,000 quota, raised nearly \$13,000,000. Upper Michigan and northern Wisconsin each went over their quotas of \$8,000,000.

The statement of Mr. Rich, which was sent to the officers of the Federal Reserve bank, the general Liberty loan executive committee, and the state, county and city Liberty loan chairmen in the Ninth Federal Reserve district, is as follows:

Loan is Over-subscribed. The total amount subscribed by the Ninth Federal Reserve district in the second Liberty loan is \$140,932,650, or an over-subscription of \$35,932,650. This amount is distributed among 621,770 individual subscribers, of whom all but 959 were subscribers in amounts of less than \$10,000.

The smaller bond buyers, among whom large numbers of farmers were found, took \$89,471,600 of second Liberty loan bonds, in denominations ranging from \$50 to \$10,000. These subscriptions were distributed as follows:

VERDICT OF GUILTY YEAR'S PROGRAM RETURNED BY JURY FOR W. C. T. U.

Dan T. Boone Must Spend 10 to 20 Years in Prison for Robbery.

Dan T. Boone, placed on trial yesterday morning before Judge John V. Dwyer on a charge of robbery in holding up Joseph Ebert, was last night found guilty and sentenced to not less than 10 years nor more than 20 years in the state prison.

The evidence showed that Boone came across Ebert and that while the pair were in a saloon drinking Boone put knockout drops in the glass of Ebert and took away from him the \$1.50 he had received from a bartender as change. The jury was out deliberating on its verdict for four hours and on returning to court found him guilty and fixed his punishment at not less than 10 years nor more than 20 years.

Boone waived time for sentence and Judge Dwyer formally pronounced the sentence of the jury. Boone in addressing the court said that he was not guilty as charged in the information, although he admitted that he served time in the state prison in California for grand larceny. It was under the name of Ed Ryan that he was convicted in California.

Montana led with a total of \$11,880,200, the bond purchases falling within this class distributed to 427 purchasers. Minnesota also led in the number of subscribers taking amounts between \$50,000 and \$100,000, there being 141 subscribers, who took \$7,542,550. In subscriptions of more than \$100,000 and less than \$200,000, Minnesota showed 41 bond buyers taking a total of \$6,147,450, and 29 bond buyers taking amounts over \$200,000, aggregating \$8,515,000.

Subscription by State.

The total subscription by states, and the total number of subscribers in each state in the Ninth district, is as follows: Amount less than \$10,000, \$89,471,600. For more than \$10,000 and less than \$50,000, 690 subscribers, taking \$19,751,999. For more than \$50,000 and less than \$100,000, 177 subscribers, taking \$10,234,450. For amounts of more than \$100,000 and less than \$200,000, 45 subscribers, taking \$9,320,450. For subscriptions of more than \$200,000, 27 subscribers, taking \$8,515,000. Total Sub-Total, 1,333,130 subscribers.

The remarkable distribution of small denomination bonds is an especially desirable and valuable feature of the second Liberty loan campaign. This is significant of the loyal and patriotic way in which the people of these states have come forward with expressions of loyalty and a desire to support their government.

Workers Receive Praise.

For the splendid result accomplished in a heavy over-subscription, and in the unusual success obtained in securing a wide popular distribution of Liberty bonds, too much credit cannot be given the loyal and patriotic men, who in every county and township in the Ninth Federal Reserve district temporarily gave up their own business affairs to devote their time and energy to the work.

At the request of the officers of the federal reserve bank, the general executive committee and the Liberty loan organizations in the states of this district will be maintained practically intact in anticipation of any further calls that may be made by the government.





KEEN INTEREST IN TALK ON "FRANCE"

There is keen interest on the lecture on "France" by Dr. Henry Huxo at the Butte high school auditorium this evening, the second of the series of eight lectures on the nations at war being given in 29 cities of the state under the auspices of the Red Cross in co-operation with the faculty of the Montana State university. Dr. Huxo is a native of France and is therefore in a position to deliver a most interesting talk and furnish first-hand information. The first lecture was on "Germany" and was delivered by President Sisson of the university. These lectures are being given simultaneously in the various cities by selected speakers. The first lecture was free, but the Red Cross feels that the lectures are so educational and useful for the American people that a small admission will be charged for the remainder, however, the admission will be very low. One dollar will provide admission for the entire series of lectures, while children will be charged only 50 cents for the series. Single admissions will be 25 cents and 10 cents. Soldiers, sailors and marines stationed here will be admitted free, and the local chapter of the Red Cross extends a most cordial invitation to Uncle Sam's boys to be guests at each lecture.
