

2 AVALANCHE OF DIRT SUFFOCATES MINER

August Gehrig Loses His Life While Retimbering in Mt. Moriah Mine.

August Gehrig, a miner 30 years old, was suffocated in soft dirt in the Mount Moriah mine this morning while retimbering near a stope on the 600-foot level. The dirt fell about the man from above. A Mantha, Gehrig's companion, was buried up to the arm pits, but managed to make his escape. Physicians spent some time trying to revive Gehrig.

The two men were working side by side when Mantha noticed a small stream of fine dirt trickling down from above them. As he stepped to one side to investigate, an avalanche of dirt descended, forcing Gehrig to his knees and then completely covering him with three or four feet of earth.

Mantha, as soon as he was able to extricate himself, started frantically digging for his comrade, but the soft dirt was hard to handle in the narrow tunnel and kept falling over Gehrig's prostrate body as fast as Mantha could dig it away. Other miners were attracted by Mantha's calls and helped take the body from the dirt pile.

Gehrig lived at 421 Colorado street. He had worked in Butte for a number of years. His only known relative is a brother, who lives in Connecticut. The body is at the Sherman & Reed undertaking parlors. Coroner Lane will hold an inquest later in the week.

PACKERS CO-OPERATE

Washington, Nov. 20.—Packing houses and the wheat industry generally are co-operating fully, the food administration announced today, in support of a meatless Tuesday.

One New York hotel reports that during October it curtailed its consumption of flour by 14 barrels as the result of "meatless Wednesdays."

The federal food administration has also sent out a statement that while meat continues to grow in popularity on the Pacific coast, it is so hearty like beef that people have mistaken it in the belief it was beefsteak, though, of course, it is always sold in the market under its true name. This new meat supply is being served in the very best restaurants as steaks, and also as hamburger steak, and a made in canned whole meat is being built up. Porpoises and dolphins are also being used for human food, as they are not fish but mammals, like the walrus.

NEW DELICACY ON "MEATLESS DAY"

Hamburger Steak Made of Whale Meat is Served in Butte.

Hamburger steak made of whale meat was part of the menu in Butte restaurants today, featuring the fourth "Meatless" day in the Mining city. The day, like the three preceding ones on which meat was barred, was another triumph for the food administration.

Reports received by William F. Love, state chairman of the Hotel and Restaurant Men's division of the food conservation committee, show that the hotels, cafes and restaurants throughout the state are observing meatless days to the letter. His reports further show that in many hotels and restaurants whaleless day is observed every Wednesday, though such a day has not yet been formally declared.

A statement received by Chairman Love from Federal Food Administrator Hoover today shows that introduction of meatless Tuesdays in hotels and restaurants has resulted in the saving by one great chain of restaurants of seven tons of meat weekly. This includes about 3,500 pounds of hog meat and 8,200 pounds of beef.



London, Nov. 20.—A telegram from Maestricht, Holland, to Amsterdam, as forwarded by the Central News, reports great movement of troops with artillery on all roads leading to the Flanders front. These troops evidently are from the Russian front, the dispatch says.
