The admissions to the course are now about 49 a week, army officials declare, and more housing quarters are needed for the men. Student aviators are being sent here from all the states in the western department of the army. In addition to this building the aeronautical laboratory here is to be enlarged. The two building enterprises will represent an expenditure of \$25,000.

FAILED TO SHOW HIS RESIDENCE

Alleged Slacker is Dismissed. Had Not Registered in Beaverhead.

Trusting in the action of the federal court in directing a verdict yesterday for an alleged slacker defendant on the grounds of non-established residence, Cyrus Smith, charged with being a slacker, went to trial before a jury in Judge Bourquin's court today, pleaded his own case and received a directed verdict of not guilty from the judge on the same grounds as those assigned for a directed verdict yesterday. Smith was arrested in Beaverhead county in October. The government showed that Smith was married in Bozeman in 1915 and that he gave his age at that time as 21 and his residence as Bozeman. The government was unable to show that Smith had ever resided in Beaverhead county. County officials of Beaverhead county testified that Smith had not registered in that county. The court held that Smith, not being a resident of Beaverhead, was not called upon to register in that county. There was no proof that he had not registered in Gallatin county, which was the only place where his residence at any time could be proven. Joe Tomajovich, an Austrian, was released on a directed verdict in federal court yesterday when he showed that he was in Alaska when registration was called in Montana, and in Montana when registration started in Alaska. The court directed the verdict for the Austrian because of the "casus omissus" in the tangle. Today's directed verdict was based on the grounds that no crime was proven to have been committed since it was not shown that the man had registered at his usual place of residence.

ARTILLERYMEN LEAVE BUTTE FOR THE COAST

Seventy Men Back to Station. More Than Two Hundred Still in City.

Seventy men of the provisional battalion, Washington coast artillery, left Butte this morning to return to their headquarters at the Puget Sound navy yards. The departure of the 70 men and one officer leaves 218 men and 19 officers of the battalion in Butte. The men now in Butte will be reviewed Thursday afternoon at 3:15 by Vice President Roosevelt and Governor Stewart at Hilsborg park. The artillerymen will meet the two officials at the depot and escort them to their hotel. Officers, including Major Dreyer, will be with the men in the review and not in the reviewing stand, it is said. The artillerymen are taking pains to see that all their equipment is in first class condition for the review this week. It will be the first military review to be held in Butte since war was declared with Germany.

SEARCH FOR LADY BUGS TO PROTECT BEAN CROP

Sacramento, Cal.—An abundant supply of lady bugs for destroying aphids in the bean fields of California will be available next spring, according to E. J. Brannigan, field deputy for the state insectary, who has just returned from a tour of the canyons in the mountains of northern California, where he has been searching for the hibernating places of the bugs. Each autumn the hibernating places are found and in the spring the lady bugs are collected for distribution by the state horticultural commission among the bean-growing centers wherever the aphids threaten to damage the crop.

PRESIDENT H. E. BYRAM OF MILWAUKEE PASSES BUTTE ON WAY EAST

Establish Zone For Loading Munition Ships

San Francisco, Nov. 20.—Orders establishing a zone within which vessels may load or unload munitions at this port became effective today, federal officials announced.

The orders were issued after arrests of several alleged German agents arriving here on ships from the South seas, two of whom have been interned at Angel Island.

Federal authorities refused to confirm a report that they had discovered a plot to blow up several munitions carriers here.

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
