MEHMET ON STAND IN OWN BEHALF

Says Glambags Hit Him Over Head—Fired to Frighten Assailant.

The trial of Hassan Mehmet for the murder of Rasep Glambags, commenced yesterday morning before Judge Dwyer and a jury, will probably reach the jury this evening. This morning testimony was introduced on the part of the defense for the purpose of showing that Mehmet was attacked by Glambags and beaten up before he drew his revolver and fired the fatal shot.

The defendant took the stand in his own behalf and told of Glambags having been given money to the amount of \$1.75 to buy food while he was out of work. Mehmet declared that on the day the trouble occurred Glambags met him and called him by name. He declared that Glambags attacked him from behind and administered a blow on the back of the head and that while he was stooping down to pick up his hat Glambags again struck him and knocked him down. The defendant said that he was struck two or three times while he was lying on the ground and that when he pulled his revolver and fired he did so for the purpose of scaring his assailant.

The cross-examination of the defendant was taken up when court resumed at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. A couple of character witnesses followed the defendant, after which the defense closed and then a couple of witnesses in rebuttal were called by the state.

In his opening statement for the defense Attorney T. J. Walker told the jury that it would be shown that Glambags was the aggressor in the trouble and that when Mehmet fired the fatal shot it was not with the intention of killing Glambags but for the purpose of scaring him and protecting himself from further assault.

Rigo Demeo was the first witness for the defense. He said that he was acquainted with the defendant and Glambags and that he was present in front of the saloon at 333 South Arizona street on the afternoon of Sept. 14 when the trouble occurred. He said that he saw Glambags hit Mehmet on the back of the head and afterwards hit him two or three times and knock the defendant down. While the defendant was down he pulled a revolver out of his inside vest pocket and fired, Glambags being between four and five feet away. The witness declared that the reputation of Glambags was bad, while that of Mehmet is good.

Hit Mehmet on Head.

Mustapha Vella was also present when the trouble occurred. He said that he saw Glambags hold the head of Mehmet and hit him two or three times. He said that he saw Mehmet fall to the ground from the effects of a blow and that it was while he was on the ground he fired the fatal shot. He declared that Mehmet had a good reputation.

J. Michl was another witness to the trouble in front of the saloon at 333 South Arizona street. He gave an illustration for the benefit of the court and jury of how Glambags attacked Mehmet and showed how the defendant took his gun out of his vest pocket while on the ground and fired the fatal shot.

Hassan Mehmet, the defendant, did not deny the shooting, but said that he fired to scare the crowd. He told of trouble between himself and Glambags previous to the afternoon of the shooting and said that when Glambags was out of work he gave him altogether \$1.75 with which to buy food. The defendant said that a friend told him that Glambags had made the threat that he was going to kill him, and meeting him the same day that he was told of the threat, Glambags denied the story and at the same time called him a number of vile names.

The defendant said that while he was standing in front of the saloon Glambags came up and hit him on the back of the head and a second blow sent him to the ground, and that while down he fired the shot which resulted in the death of Glambags. Before firing the shot the defendant said that while on the ground he heard some one shout, "Beat him more."

The taking of testimony was commenced yesterday afternoon. James Cassidy was the first witness. He said that when he prepared the body for burial he found two wounds, one above the right hip and the other in the abdomen.

Chief of Police Murphy told of the arrest of Mehmet. The witness said that Mehmet told him that the trouble started over a debt of \$1.75 which Glambags owed him. The gun found on Mehmet was introduced and identified by the chief of police. The chief said that there were several cartridges in the gun and that the trigger had been pulled, but they had not been discharged.

Mike Kasonovich said that he was standing in the doorway of the saloon at 333 South Arizona street when Mehmet and Glambags with several others came along. The witness said that the men were arguing about something in some language unknown to him. He said that he saw Mehmet strike Glambags and then the latter saw Mehmet search his pockets and finally he found a gun in an inside vest pocket. He then ran after Glambags. The latter came up and went into the saloon, followed by Mehmet. As the latter entered the saloon he fired and Mehmet saw the defendant put his hand on his hip, shouting and crying. Mehmet came up close to Glambags and placed the gun against his neck and pulled the trigger, but the weapon did not discharge. Glambags crawled behind the piano and the proprietor of the saloon caught Mehmet and prevented him from doing any more shooting.





CORRESPONDENT RIDES IN BRITISH TANK ON BATTLE LINE IN NORTHERN FRANCE



"That the tryout might be complete, artificial obstacles had been prepared, and the tank took them like a giant iron beetle in a clumsy steeplechase."—From Kenneth Payne's description of his trip in a British tank.

A "Tankodrome." France.—After taking a trip in a tank, and going over grounds where... the ungainly mechanical beasts have been performing for our benefit, I am able to answer a question which has puzzled so many newspaper readers at home.

The question is, "Why are the tanks always written about in the press dispatches as though the whole subject was chiefly humorous, and the tanks themselves nothing but great gawky jokes?"

The answer is that... a tank doing stunts proves to be in fact most exorcisingly funny.

When we arrived at this particular tankodrome, a number of the creatures were pawing the ground in the center of a field, apparently eager to begin the show.

Jules Verne, a Broddingnagian horse show. Near the field, sheds and shops housed tanks in various stages of construction and repair. In one corner of the field a number of the uncouth beasts had apparently been let out to graze.

Climbing aboard one which was ready in the center of the field to be put through its paces, I found an interior as neat and shipshape as an ocean liner.

It was clean and polished, its walls painted white, and there was even a matting carpet on the small bits of floor space not pre-empted by intricate machinery.

Some of the crew are continually tinkering, do not seem to be raising any very deafening din.

Like ship's officers on the bridge, two of the tank's masters are perched up forward, peering out ahead and coaxing various stunts out of the beast.

The power... lurking in its ponderous frame was evident when it first began to indulge in maneuvers. While gliding easily over the straightaway, at every turn it lurched heavily, exactly like a mammoth animal alive with a great deal more strength than it knew what to do with.

That the try-out might be complete, artificial obstacles had been prepared, and the tank took them like a giant iron beetle engaged in a clumsy steeplechase.

It rumbled head-on up the face of a mound of earth and timbers (trailing back) passengers about like peas in a pod... panting, pawing and, and finally clambered after a slip or two right up the side of the mound

and flopped down on top like a cat scrambling onto a rock.

After a moment's rest it dived off the other side, giving Mother Earth and its passengers a terrific jolt, and smashing everything within reach.

That's the kind of animal the crews ride into battle.

It is no secret that they do not invariably come back. There are casualties as well as airplane casualties. I have clambered as one of a party of correspondents through tanks, battered and ditched and full of debris of a battle-field.

"What a hellish way to meet one's death, in that iron shell!" was a universal comment.

It must be a ghastly fate, and there are more candidates for martyrdom in the tanks than can be accounted for.

When the fall story of the tank was told, it will rival the greatest accomplishments by any branch of the service.

But for the present we still have to treat their exploits mostly as a matter of course.

CONSIDERABLE CLASS TO THIS EYE OF GLASS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 20.—An official optic, so perfect that it is a critical examination of physical conditions responsible for its own failure, has been discharged from service in the army at Camp Travis. The men had been drafted from various home towns and, appearing before a commission board, passed the examination, and having otherwise been accepted and came to Camp Travis for training with several others from his state.

He had been enlisted and was being trained by the army. He was a color test by the army doctors, and a blind was put over the good eye of the perfect glass optic.
