STATE EXHIBITORS PRESENT PROTEST

Special Meeting of Montana Film Men Held at Leggat Today.
The Montana Theatrical and Exhibitors' league today affiliated with the national organization and will join the country-wide protest against the war tax of 15 cents per reel per day which has been shelved on the exhibitors by the film producers. This was decided on at a special meeting of the exhibitors of the state held at the Leggat hotel late this afternoon.
The meeting was called by President Phil Levy in answer to numerous requests from exhibitors all over the state. The meeting was called for the purpose of protesting against the tax on the pictures which the producers are attempting to levy on the theaters which show the pictures. The explanation of the protest by the Montana exhibitors was made in the address delivered by President Levy. Among other things Mr. Levy said:
"The film corporations have decreed that the exhibitors shall pay, not alone the war tax on admissions to their theaters, but also the war tax on the films themselves, so relieving the film corporations from any tax at all and imposing two taxes on the exhibitors."
"The injustice of the stand taken by the film corporations is apparent. The exhibitors of the state are paying all the war taxes directly concerned with our houses. Let the film corporations pay the taxes directly concerned with their business. That is only a fair adjustment of the situation. If it were not for the money spent by the exhibitors in developing the business in this state, building splendid theaters, furnishing them in the most up-to-date manner, installing large organs at great cost, providing orchestras, spending big sums on advertising and in every possible manner furthering the film game in the various cities, where would the film corporations be?
"In spite of advancing prices for films, in spite of increasing rents, in spite of higher wages for employees, in spite of the higher cost for the furnishings for our houses, the theaters of the state are supplying the very best films obtainable in the market of America and paying the highest prices of any city of the same size in the country. It is true admission prices have been increased recently, but not on account of the war tax, but on account of the fabulous sums of money that we are now paying for our film services stars that we have made popular through the medium of our enormous advertising in the daily papers.
"There is much talk nowadays about slackers and there is no greater slacker than the one who throws the burden to the other fellow. And that is exactly what is being done by the film corporations. Let us tell the film producers that we are willing to do the fair thing by paying the war tax on the admission to our theaters and let the film corporations pay the war tax on their own products."

CROWN PRINCE'S PLAN WAS UPSET

Activity of French Made it Impossible to Inaugurate Attack.
The confidence of the crown prince in the success of his plan to capture the French was so great that he had ordered 12 teams of six horses each to be ready to gallop off with the captured French cannon, while an officer and 50 men of the engineer corps were to stand by prepared to destroy gun positions and guns that could not be carried off.
It had been arranged that an extremely dense cloud of gas should be emitted over the French infantry and artillery positions during 15 minutes before the shock troops advanced to the attack. Batteries of field guns were to be stationed in immediate support of the shock troops. Airplanes were to fly low and participate in the infantry work. The whole operation was, according to arrangement, to result in what was called the "German orders" a "summer harvest." It was fixed for Aug. 16-17.
On Aug. 16 the French troops started a movement in front of their account for on that date they opened their artillery preparation for the intended attack on Aug. 20. The men that the Germans holding the Champagne front, show that the chief part in the operation was to be played by the First Bavarian division, which was brought up to full strength for the purpose and speed training for the task. SUGAR PURCHASES ARE LIMITED

Merchants' Association New Rule Because of Shortage.
A limit for purchases of sugar in Butte stores was placed today by the Butte Merchants' association. The holder cannot purchase more than 25 cents worth of sugar at one time, less \$2 worth of groceries in the same time, in which case the household can buy \$1 worth of groceries.
This action has been deemed necessary because of the fact that the supply is short and the Butte merchants' association is endeavoring to cooperate with the government conservation bureau.
Secretary Charles Austin of the Butte Merchants' association mailed notices to this effect to the retailer in the city.
