### HOPE TO INCREASE FARM PRODUCTION

Large Sum Available for Use in the Treasury State.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Nov. 21.—To stimulate farm production in Montana during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, the very tidy sum of \$114,333.38 has been made available under apportionment just announced by the department of agriculture. This allotment distributes three separate and distinct funds known as the emergency fund, the regular agricultural promotion fund and the Smith-Lever fund. The apportionment to Montana is as follows:  
Emergency fund .....\$84,800.00  
Regular fund ..... 13,750.00  
Smith-Lever fund ..... 17,866.69

The sums made available under the first two heads are direct gifts to the state, but in order to avail itself of the Smith-Lever fund the state must match dollar for dollar. This means that, all told, the amount made available for the state is the sum of three federal apportionments plus the extra \$17,866.69 which the state must raise. Congress at the last session, as an emergency war measure to increase farm productivity, appropriated \$3,170,000 as an emergency fund to be distributed among the states by the department of agriculture to be used through the farm extension machinery of the department in the states to induce among the farmers the best ideas as to how they may make their land produce more than it has heretofore. This money will be used chiefly in paying the salaries of experts who will go out among the farmers and present to them the methods which the department of agriculture has found most effective in increasing the soil yield. This "emergency" fund, as its name indicates, is not a regular expenditure, but was authorized to serve a special purpose while the war is on, and prudence demands that every acre be made to produce to its utmost capacity. The other two funds are regular funds, established under former acts of congress, and allotments are made under their provisions every year.

### CHARLES E. RUSSELL TO SPEAK HERE TOMORROW

Former Socialist Orator and Member of Mission to Russia Coming.

Charles Edward Russell, a well known writer, former leader in the socialist party and member of the Root mission to Russia, will arrive in Butte tomorrow morning at 9:15 o'clock. He is making a trip to Butte in the interests of the recently organized American Alliance for Labor and Democracy and he will deliver an address at the Empress theater tomorrow night.

A dozen prominent citizens will be at the Great Northern depot to welcome Mr. Russell when he arrives and in an auto draped with a huge American flag he will be taken to his hotel. He will attend the luncheon to be tendered to Vice President Marshall at the Butte Grill at the noon hour. The meeting at the Empress theater will take place at 8:30 p. m. F. A. Higelow will be chairman and United States District Attorney Wheeler will deliver an address of welcome to Mr. Russell.

### MAY ORGANIZE DEFENSE FORCE

War Department Has Plan Under Consideration—As to Home Guard.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Nov. 21.—A special interior defense force may be organized in Montana and other states to guard public utilities and war plants from pro-German plotters. The war department has under consideration the organization of such a force. Use of drafted men or home defense leagues for this purpose has been suggested, but no decision has been reached concerning the makeup of the new force. This matter was brought to the attention of the war department when Gen. W. H. Carter, commander of the central department, inquired concerning the use of regular troops to guard plants near Chicago. It was explained the government's policy is for the states to guard such property as far as possible. The failure of some states to provide this protection may cause the organization of a special force under governmental auspices.

### DR. PITKANEN CHARGED WITH SEDITIOUS TALK

United States District Attorney Issues the Complaint Against Him.

Charged with having uttered remarks tending to interfere with the naval and military forces of the United States during time of war, Dr. Gust Pitkanen, a physician of Butte, is under arrest in Red Lodge. A complaint under the espionage act was issued yesterday from the district attorney's office against the physician. It is alleged that Pitkanen declared the war was a means of enriching the president and other high government officials; that the United States is wrong and Germany right in the prosecution of the world war. America entered the conflict, the man is alleged to have said, for the sole purpose of enriching those in power. Dr. Pitkanen is a Finlander of Butte and a physician that has held strong influence among the Butte Finlanders. It is said that the physician will be given a hearing before the United States commissioner at Red Lodge.

### ORDER FROZEN POULTRY BE RELEASED AT ONCE

Storage Men Must Unload 1,700,000 Pounds Turkey Before Thanksgiving.

New York, Nov. 21.—Drastic action ordered by the food administration may greatly cheapen the price of frozen poultry to the consumer. The order directs: 1. The immediate sale of all poultry in storage from last year, to avoid penalty for hoarding food, under the United States war act. 2. The sale of 1,769,196 pounds of frozen turkeys before Thanksgiving. 3. The sale of a similar amount of frozen turkeys before New Year's. 4. The sale of all poultry, now in cold storage, before March 1, 1918. Reports from the country revealed 46,206,059 pounds of frozen poultry now in storage. Of this 3,538,393 pounds consist of turkeys, or 212 per cent more turkeys than were in storage last year.

### NIGHT SCHOOLS AGAIN TO BE MEETING TOPIC

The matter of night schools for Butte for the education of foreign born people will be made a special order of business at next week's meeting of the school trustees of the city. This board held last evening. Permission was granted to graduates of the school to use the gymnasium while training for a game with the Washington Coast artillery football squad. Labor bills were allowed and a report made on the industrial school for the month.

### ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

The Butte high school is to have an alumni association that will be organized along regular lines and will hold regular meetings. This was decided last evening at a meeting of a number of the alumni. Another meeting will be held on Dec. 5, when fuller details of the association will be announced.
