Omaha, Neb., Nov. 22.—Three men were yesterday ordered interned for the duration of the war and will be taken to Fort Douglas, Utah, today. They are Martin Zschakna, a farmer, who is said to have terrorized a neighborhood near Kearney, Neb., by backing up his pro-German utterances with firearms; Walter Krolmeyer, an alien enemy, and Edward Martin, a resident of Blair, Neb., who is said to have expressed a desire to fight for the kaiser.

HEALTH LAWS TO BE OBSERVED NOW

City Officials Are Going on the Trail of Persons Who Endanger Health.

The city police department, backed by the health department, is going to clean up some of the dirty stains on the ordinances of the city of Butte. The police start today by launching a campaign against persons who use the sidewalks as impromptu cesspools. Expectation upon the sidewalks today and hereafter will cost somewhere between \$5 and \$50, if the "copper" sees the offender. Waste paper must be kept off the street. Automobiles must be washed in some place other than the streets, and cesspools cannot be cleaned in gutters any more. Verily, it is going to be made a warm climate for those who infringe upon the health ordinances of the city," says the health officer.

Dr. W. C. Matthews, city physician, will soon propose an ordinance providing that all persons in the city who handle food pass a physical test. Contagious diseases are being spread in this city by unclean persons who handle foodstuffs, says Dr. Matthews. He wants the commissary and persons to be made as strict as the campaign against flies and filth. The health department announces that the new flushing dump for night soil near the Butte Reduction works is about ready for use.

HUNDRED BOYS ENROLL IN THRIFT CAMPAIGN

Are Given Songs to Sell Under Plan of Los Angeles Merchant.

At a mass meeting of boys in the city Auditorium last night the Butte branch of the Silverwood Boys Savings club was formally organized. More than 100 boys joined the organization by taking out sets of songs. After setting the songs the boys will make their return to J. H. Baumbach and James R. Spomer at the City Auditorium on Saturday afternoon. The thrift plan and campaign as briefly outlined by Miss Lillian Gattin, the representative of the Los Angeles merchant, are as follows:

Each boy is given six copies of Mr. Silverwood's song, "We Want the Flowers Now," and is to sell the song at 25 cents a copy. They will return the \$1.50 to the committee and will be given 25 cents of this directly as a present; 25 cents will be sent to the publishers to cover the cost of printing, and the remaining \$1 will be placed in the postal savings bank to the credit of the boy. This \$1 is to stay in the bank for five years, except in case of sickness or death. The name and address will be sent to Mr. Silverwood and he will write a personal letter to the boy, encouraging him in his policy of thrift. Every year during the five in which the money remains in the bank Mr. Silverwood will add \$1 to the account of every boy who deposits \$5 or more for himself. Arrangements for additional boys to join are under way.

DR. SPILLMAN NAMED DEAN OF WASHINGTON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

Fullman, Wash., Nov. 22.—Dr. W. J. Spillman, chief of the office of farm management in the United States department of agriculture, has accepted the position of dean of the college of agriculture at Washington State college, according to advices received from Washington, D. C., today. He will assume his duties here April 1, 1918. Dr. Spillman is now engaged in making a survey of the farm labor problem in the United States, an emergency war measure, and he expects to complete it by April. Dr. Spillman first came into national prominence in 1901 as head of the department of agriculture of the state college, he discovered "Mendal's law," which is now the fundamental guidance of scientists in the work of plant and animal breeding.

WATCH OF ATTORNEY IS NOT WITH COURT CLOCK

"Billie" Sullivan's Client Fined for Coming to Court Late.

W. G. Sullivan, attorney for the Metal Mine Workers, has a watch that does not agree with the clock in federal court. Sullivan and his client, Otto Tynkalla, were in court this morning, according to Sullivan's watch. The big clock in the courtroom testified "five minutes after 10 o'clock."

"Why are you late?" asked the judge. "Thought I was on time," said Sullivan, producing his watch and examining it. "Are you entered as this man's attorney?" asked the court. "Not yet." "If you had been entered I would have fined you for being late. As it is I will fine your client \$10 and recommend him to the care of the United States marshal." The case was then put over until this afternoon. Tynkalla is charged with being a slacker in failing to register.

DISTINGUISHED JAPANESE ENTERTAINED AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—Dr. Etsuro Uchihara, professor of political economy of the Meiji university, Japan, and four members of the Japanese parliament, who comprise a Japanese parliamentary mission which has been studying conditions in the United States for the past two months, were guests of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce today at lunch.

Last night the commissioners met here for the first time since they separated in New York about six weeks ago and traveled incognito in different directions to make investigations undisturbed by entertainments which an official party would be offered.

The commissioners say they have been studying conditions from the standpoint of the people of Japan. The members of parliament in the party were Tokichi Matsuo, Toshiyoshi Shimada, Kotaro Mochizuki and Shoji T. Yamane.

Honolulu, Nov. 22.—The steamer Thor foundered at latitude 24 north, longitude 155 west. It was reported by Capt. O. A. who reached port with 35 men his crew today. One member of the crew is still missing. The Thor, 4,729 tons, was en route from Honolulu to the Hawaiian Islands. The Thor sailed from Honolulu Nov. 11, carrying 100 passengers. Captain Hansen said that the other lifeboats were empty and steering for Honolulu.
