

YOU TO FAILS TO APPEAR BOND FORFEITED

Thomas Haines' Bondsmen Are Out \$3,000—Fugina Assault Trial on.

Thomas Haines, charged with a statutory offense, was to have been tried before Judge Dwyer and a jury today but failed to answer his name and his bond of \$3,000 was declared forfeited.

When the case was called this morning Attorney A. B. Melzer said that his client was out of the city, but his whereabouts were unknown. He had not seen him for some time. He therefore asked that the setting be vacated. This request was opposed by Chief Deputy County Attorney N. A. Rotering. He pointed out to the court that Haines knew his case was set for this morning and that therefore there was not any excuse for his failure to appear. The chief deputy said that Haines had a bond of \$3,000 up for his appearance and he asked that it be declared forfeited. The request of the county attorney's office was complied with and an order made directing the county attorney to proceed at once with the collection of the bond.

The bond is signed by William H. Burton, a retired railroad man, and George W. Bowen, both of whom qualified in double the amount required. The case of Peter Fugina, charged with first degree assault, was also set for this morning, and it went to trial with Attorney J. R. Barta representing the defendant and Chief Deputy County Attorney N. A. Rotering and Deputy County Attorney Frank L. Riley representing the state. It is alleged that Fugina fired a revolver shot at his wife, Matilda Fugina, with intent to kill and commit murder. The following are the names of the jury selected to hear the case: William O'Neill, C. S. Jackson, Edwin Symons, J. R. William, J. Brady, E. R. Clayton, Stephen M. Holland, Frank Nelson, William Caldwell and John J. Morgan.

After the jury had been sworn Deputy County Attorney Frank L. Riley made a brief opening statement, informing the court and jury that the state expected to prove that Fugina deliberately fired a shot at his wife with the intention of killing her. Mrs. Fugina being unable to appear in court to give testimony, the court, jury and attorneys proceeded to the Columbia block, where her version of the affair was told.

WE MEAN BUSINESS.

With the Bayonet.

At the little village of Narazino, on the slopes of Monte Monfenera, the enemy first gained lodgment and sought to surround the large Italian force, but was thrown back by a splendid rally of the Italian lines, which swept forward with cheers until the position was clear. It was the bloodiest kind of fighting, with bayonets first and then with bayonets wrenched from their sockets and used as double-edged knives.

Again the enemy massed forces higher up on Monte Monfenera, backed by batteries concentrated from all points. Before this intense shell fire the Italian infantry gave ground slowly until the upper slopes were abandoned. But the fighting goes on with unabated desperation and it is still too soon to say what the outcome may be of this heaviest blow to break through to the western Venetian plains.

The conduct of the Italian troops is above all praise. They are contesting every foot of the way, fighting like tigers and with spirit and confidence, even in the face of greatly superior numbers.

GERMANS CAPTURE MOUNTAIN CRESTS


