HOOVER DENOUNCES MEN WHO DELUDE THE PUBLIC

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—"Crooks, thieves and confidence operators" are the terms applied by J. Edgar Hoover today to persons who are attempting to commiserate foodstuffs from householders of the country under the guise of government authority.

Complaints that foodstuffs have been obtained from housewives to the tune of \$100,000 have been reaching the local administration and demands have been made that any one is authorized to collect food. The officers ask chiefly for \$100 to \$200 and generous, maintaining that the collection has been ordered by the government for support of the army.

"I wish to see emphatically that no department of the government has or ever will make such demands on housewives, and that all such persons are petty frauds and should be held for the law," Mr. Hoover said.

MAY SERVE WITH THEIR OWN TROOPS

Officers From Training Camps to Go With State Contingents.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Montana officers graduated from the training camp will be interested to know that they will be permitted, insofar as it is practicable, to serve in the war with Montana troops.

Adj. Gen. Henry P. McCain has sent the following telegram to commanders of the national guard contingents: "It is desired to authorize officers appointed from training camps to serve with troops from their own states if they so desire. To accomplish this they will modify all such officers that they can make application to you for transfer to the national guard division containing troops from their states. After carefully scrutinizing such applications so that this privilege may not be abused and satisfying yourself that the transfer requested undoubtedly will put the officer with troops from his state, you will issue the necessary travel order, sending copies to this office. These transfers will be made so as not to leave your division without sufficient officers for its organization."

With the movement of troops to the concentration camps and thence to France the war department is being urged with inquiries as to what will become of various army posts, recruit depots and other military establishments throughout the country. The disposition of the posts being immediately many persons seem to have jumped at the conclusion that the posts are to be permanently abandoned and business and other interests that profit by selling food and commodities of various kinds to the soldiers are in high dudgeon.

Mal W. S. Graves, secretary of the general staff is doing all he can to point out on the troubled waters by extending assurances that the war department has the intention of abandoning any necessary bases. The general staff is at Ft. Belknap, Harrison, Ft. George Wright and other places will be used in the future to the extent of their permanent capacity, he says. The recruit depots at Columbus Barracks, Ft. Thomas, Ky.; Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.; and elsewhere continue to serve as recruit depots for the work of recruiting for the army through the usual channels goes steadily ahead in other words, Mal Graves says, nobody need worry that the war department will close down any post or recruit depot, although, of course, there is some uncertainty as to how the posts will be reorganized.

Nyland, a man who in the past has been doing considerable business in taking assignments. It is expected to finish the case late this afternoon.

SPITTING ON STREET CARS TO BRING FINES

To stop spitting on street cars and to punish offenders against the city ordinance, W. C. Matthews, city physician, is preparing plans to give every conductor on Butte street cars enough police power to handle this sort of offense.

It is proposed by the physician, in a letter to the street railway company today, to provide special ordinance giving the conductors of street cars power to make arrests for violations of the health laws.

CITY BOARD SENDING DRAFT SUGGESTIONS

A Call for Volunteer Workers Issued for Compiling Data for Congress.

The city exemption board is busy today filling out a list of suggestions for the war department. The questions will be answered and suggestions furnished today. The data will be sent to Washington tonight and will not be made public.

Chairman Eugene Carroll of the local state of national defense conferred with the board this morning and offered the services of his order in any way in the preparation of figures of the first draft and the preparation for the second draft system.

The city board has issued a call for volunteers to aid in preparing data for the first draft record. Persons who have had experience in clerical work or in typewriting are asked to give a few hours' time each day that the city of Butte may send in its records to congress in due time and in good shape. Persons who are willing to aid in the work should notify some of the board members at the city hall.

U. S. TROOPS IN CANADA FIRST TIME SINCE 1776

Montreal, Quebec, Nov. 22.—For the first time in the history of the present generation, if not since the Declaration of Independence, armed American troops are in Montreal to participate in the Victory loan parade today.

MAJOR GENERALS BACK FROM FRONT

Have First-Hand Information as to the Best Methods of Trench Fighting.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Fresh from the European battle front a dozen or more major generals who command national army and national guard divisions in this country are returning with first-hand knowledge of war conditions in Europe which will be invaluable in furnishing both the "top" and the training to put their divisions into first class fighting trim for the clash with the Huns that is coming.

Other major generals will return later with the same knowledge obtained by experience and the national army and national guard divisions, which have been temporarily without their commanding officers for some weeks, will soon be ranging at top speed under the direction of officers who are familiar with modern warfare as carried on in Europe.

An expert who is familiar with the plans of the war department in enabling the major generals to get first-hand contact with war conditions before taking their men over the ocean said:

"The return of these major generals who have been given the advantage of personal contact with General Pershing and the expeditionary army means that from now until the time comes for the troops still in this country to go abroad they will be in training under divisional officers and staff officers who are no longer theorists, but possess specific knowledge of modern warfare which all of them, until now, lacked."

"The experience which these officers have gained in France is regarded as of the utmost importance. The experiment of sending them across the Atlantic to see for themselves how modern battles are fought, how modern armies are organized and trained, has proved a success, and more will go over from time to time until every army unit in the United States is acting in thorough harmony with the army in France and along the lines of work that have been laid out by General Pershing and approved by him under actual conditions of warfare."

It so happened that nearly all of the major generals commanding the various divisions at the different cantonments and national guard camps, who were sent to France a year ago, were in the battle area when American troops were forced by the recent sudden assault of the Germans on the Rhine-Marne canal to go over the top and take their baptism of fire. Thus they have been able not only to study the military systems employed by the French and British armies on the western front, but they have been given the opportunity to see how those systems worked out as applied to the American forces, and they have seen those troops in battle and observed for themselves how Americans adapt themselves to the condition of trench warfare.

And the details of the recent fighting on the Lorraine border, in which some of Pershing's men participated, are known to those divisional commanders fortunate enough to have been present at the time. Information which necessarily has been withheld from the public by General Pershing is in their possession in full and army officers here appreciate its importance in connection with the training of troops on this side of the Atlantic.

The return of these general officers marks the beginning of a new era in the training camps, of the final stage of instruction that is to fit them for the finishing touches that will be put on behind the lines in France. The elimination of all unnecessary details and concentration upon those features which General Pershing emphasizes will give a new direction to the training program of the country. It will be an inspiration to the men to know that their officers have been in actual contact with the war, that everything they learn from now on will have a direct bearing upon their own participation in the war.

NEW RANGES OPENED TO INCREASE MEAT SUPPLY

Washington, Nov. 22.—How new ranges in the national forests are being opened up to increase the country's meat supply is indicated by a forestry service announcement today that by use of a three-decker large capable of carrying 2,700 sheep, a hitherto unused range for approximately 75,000 sheep at the head of Lake Cheilan, Washington, has been made available. The head of the lake is accessible only by boat and narrow mountain trails.
