PEOPLE EAGER TO GET INTO THRIFT CAMPAIGN

J. K. Heslet, Member of Director Turner's Organization Committee, Returns From Northern Section of the State and Reports Completion of Campaign Organization in Fourteen Counties. "People in Every One of These Will Oversubscribe the Apportionment," Was His Comment.

Thrift stamps and war saving certificates promise to be more popular in northern Montana than the liberty bonds.

This is the information brought back from that part of the state by J. K. Heslet, after organizing the workers of 14 counties. Mr. Heslet held meetings with representative citizens of these counties in Helena, Great Falls and Havre. The counties in which he perfected organizations are: Lewis and Clark, Broadwater, Teton, Cascade, Chouteau, Fergus, Flathead, Lincoln, Toole, Hill, Blaine, Phillips, Valley and Sheridan.

"People in the counties I visited are determined that they shall subscribe more than their county allotments," said Mr. Heslet with enthusiasm, today, in making his report to State Director Harry W. Turner. "They are determined to help the government with their small savings. In every place I visited I was given the most enthusiastic support."

State Director Turner is busily engaged in perfecting his organization of the 42 counties of the Treasure state. Mr. Turner has named county chairmen in 15 counties. Chairmen named today were:

Man Wanted in Montana on Charge of Robbing Postoffice.

San Francisco, Nov. 27.—George Desmond, said to be wanted in Montana for alleged postoffice robbery, has been arrested in Long Beach, Cal. Inspector S. H. Morse of the postal department says Desmond's arrest puts a stop to a long list of postoffice robberies in southern California.

H. G. Murphy, assistant United States district attorney, has sworn to an information against Desmond and has asked his removal from California to this state. The district attorney's office says Desmond is actually connected with but one postoffice robbery in Montana, as far as they know, this being the St. Ignace theft.

All Banks Agents.

In line with instructions received from Harrison B. Riley of Washington, federal director of the national war savings committee, Director Turner today named all national banks and incorporated state banks in Montana as agents to handle the issue.

BLAME IS PLACED.

MONDAH TRUST MAY AMEND ITS COMPLAINT

Authorized to Set Up Perpetual Rights Claim in the Amended Bill.

Judge Bourquin today declared that the suit of the Mondah Trust company against the city of Livingston, an injunction, is property a case for the federal courts. At the same time, a motion by the city to vacate the order to show cause was granted by the court. The court held that the water works franchise in Livingston might be a perpetual one and authorized the plaintiff to set up such rights. The defendant was allowed ten days after service of such amended bill within which to appear and plead.

PAINTERS' STRIKE ENDED.

The strike of the painters' union, which lasted 11 weeks, has been settled by action of the union and the master painters. The compromise which led to an adjustment of the controversy was brought about through repeated conferences between the strike committee of the union and a committee of master painters.
