Helena, Dec. 4.—Frank Fisher and John O'Neill, sentenced to be hanged in Butte for murder, have filed a petition for a rehearing with the state supreme court here. A review of the case is asked of the higher court. No decision has been rendered.

The Woman's Patriotic association today shipped to France a box of gauze surgical dressings from the room in the courthouse. The association has received from the Red Cross headquarters in Minneapolis two gross of bandages and one gross of hospital shirts, cut out ready for sewing together. Samples of the large khaki colored handkerchiefs for use in the trenches have been received by the association and it is intended to make up large numbers of them for the Montana men at the front.

Up and Down the State

Much interest attaches in Great Falls to the institution of Montana army lodge No. 1, which is the first state grand lodge of Masons to establish an army lodge during the present war. Maj. Jesse B. Roote, formerly an attorney of this city, is senior warden of the lodge.

First steps were taken at a meeting held at the courthouse at Havre for the organization of a choral union.

In the event of a fuel shortage at Missoula this winter deadwood from logged off lands near Missoula will be made available at a nominal price.

Religious services in the German language will not be allowed any longer at the Lone Rock school house on Three Mile, beyond Livingston, under an order of the district trustees. A number of German Lutherans live in the neighborhood and they have been holding meetings one Sunday a month.

Twenty-two thousand acres of school land, most of which is located within 12 miles of Geraldine and along the Milwaukee railroad between Lewistown and Great Falls, will be sold at public auction at the courthouse in Fort Benton, Dec. 11.

The Red Cross ambulance donated by the Lewistown lodge of Elks is now ready for shipment abroad, or to any point where it may be needed, from the factory.

Forty thousand dollars will be expended for improvement in the Milwaukee railroad yards at Roundup.

Ground for a park to be established on a triangular plot bounded by Tremont and Blaine streets and Higgins avenue, in Missoula, has been donated to the city by Missoula lodge No. 13, A. F. and A. M.

E. Brook Martin and E. B. Tipton of Bozeman have made arrangements for the construction of a modern three-story apartment house to cost approximately \$50,000.
