"We adhered to that agreement and the product normally imported into this country went abroad because better prices could be obtained. We were forced to close our refineries for lack of supplies."

**HOUSE COMMITTEE WILL PROBE NAVY DEPARTMENT**

Washington, Dec. 14.—A house subcommittee is to thoroughly investigate the conduct of the war by the navy today in executive session. Hearings will be arranged soon. Secretary Daniels, bureau chiefs and officers who have been on duty abroad will be called.

The plans for investigation were unanimously agreed upon. Members of the committee say that as at the last session \$1,500,000,000 was appropriated for naval expenditures and that this year another billion is proposed, the system of expending such vast sums should be examined.


