RED CROSS ASSURED OF 3,000 IN BEAVERHEAD

Drive for Membership Continues Unabated Under Selway's Direction.

Dillon, Dec. 22.—The Red Cross membership campaign being waged in Beaverhead county under the direction of Senator E. O. Selway, chairman of that committee, is bringing in many new members. More than 1,500 new members have been secured for the Beaverhead Red Cross chapter and almost all of these are out of town people. Mr. Selway anticipated that at least 3,000 members would be secured during the campaign, but indications point to the fact that more than that number of new members will be secured.

LAND BRINGS GOOD FIGURE AT AUCTION

APPOINTMENT OF SCHOOL MONEY MADE

Dillon, Dec. 22.—Miss Elizabeth Sutherland, county superintendent of schools, has just completed the appointment of school money for the various districts in the county. There are 46 districts in the county among which will be distributed \$49,315.29. There are 2,112 children attending school in the 46 districts. Of the money apportioned all but \$1,274.25 will go into the general fund. This small amount goes into the library funds of the school districts.

School district No. 19, or the Dillon district, gets the biggest slice of the money. For 1,021 children a total of \$23,840 will be distributed. District No. 12 gets the next largest amount.

SCHOOLS CLOSE FOR CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY

Dillon, Dec. 22.—The public schools of the city were closed yesterday afternoon with exercises in almost all of the rooms. The children will enjoy a two week vacation in the city. Many of the Normal critic teachers left for Butte and other cities, where they will spend the mid-winter vacation.

Deer Lodge, Dec. 22.—Matt Miller died at his home in this city Wednesday morning of pneumonia. Funeral services were held from the Episcopal church this afternoon at 1 o'clock, the Rev. W. J. Atwood officiating.

Mr. Miller was born 44 years ago and was a native of Denmark. He had been in the state for the past 13 years, and about seven years ago took up a homestead on the bench land about nine miles southeast of the city, and was one of the first successful dry farmers in that section. For a number of years he had been suffering with pneumonia and was unable to follow his work. He is survived by his wife.

UP AND DOWN THE STATE

Work has been started on the erection of a modern fireproof theater building at Harlowton. The theater will be housed in a three story reinforced concrete structure, to be erected at a cost of about \$62,000.

The Montana State Dairy association will hold the annual convention at Whitehall on the 27th and 28th of December. The program will be brim full of interest and profit to everyone who has a cow at home.

When the improvements now under way at Chico Hot Springs are completed, no resort in the northwest will be more attractive. About \$50,000 has been expended on the construction of a new and larger plunge and an addition to the hotel.

Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Small cheese factory at Corvallis. The building, machinery and \$4,000 worth of cheese were a total loss.

After the longest operating period in its history, the Eureka Lumber company has closed down for the season, with a record of 50,000,000 feet of logs sawed. Because of a shortage of labor and other factors the cut was not quite as large as usual.

Alon Woodfolk of Big Timber now lays claim to the title of having shipped the heaviest steer from Montana this year. In the shipment sent out to Chicago by Magnus Lindstrand, Woodfolk had a steer that weighed 1,900 pounds at Chicago. It sold for \$13.75 a hundred or a total of \$261.25.

Needing more revenue, the city council of Deer Lodge has passed an ordinance, effective Feb. 1, providing for the licensing of all motor vehicles. The fee is \$2 a year on a machine and \$25 on horse power, and \$3 on machines of greater horse power.

There are more men than jobs at present around Billings, according to Miss Thompson, acting secretary of the Billings Chamber of Commerce, which maintains a free employment bureau. She says dozens of men apply daily for work.
