MILWAUKEE CUTS OFF EQUIPMENT

Observation Cars Discontinued Between Chicago and St. Paul.

Indications that other railroad lines operating from the west to the east will follow the example of the Great Northern Railway company, and discontinue what is regarded as unnecessary extra service on trains, are contained in an advice received by the city office of the Milwaukee this morning from Seattle. The observation car on trains Nos. 17 and 18 will be discontinued at once between Chicago and the Twin Cities. For the present, however, the observation will be maintained between Seattle and St. Paul.

While this is the purport of the message received today, it is more than likely that in a very short time the observation car will be discontinued from one end of the system to the other and that lounge and parlor cars will follow suit. So far neither the Northern Pacific nor the Oregon Short Line has received any notification as to cessation of any of the services of travel. The new railroad situation, consequent upon the government taking over the direction of railroad transportation service throughout the country, has caused much conjecture here among the local railroad men. Being without further details, advice other than what has been carried in the associated press dispatches the Butte officials cannot hazard a guess as to what will be the next step. Whether the passenger and freight offices of all railroads in all cities will be "pooled" is a matter of conjecture, although such a course seems quite possible and in fact even probable.

MYSTERY DEEPENS ABOUT WOMAN SPY

Man Held for Murder is Said to Have Become Involved Over Her.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 28.—John Knox, arrested yesterday in connection with the killing of Herman Jakobaleh in a remote part of San Gabriel canyon, today identified, according to the sheriff's office, the mysterious "H," an alleged German woman agent, said to have directed the activities of Franz Schulerberg, held at San Francisco as a spy.

This woman, according to a statement attributed to Knox by deputy sheriffs, is a German whose husband lives at a mountain camp. He gave her name and officers set out immediately in search of her.

Knox was arrested in a wild part of the canyon 50 miles northeast of here, where there are three cabins—Knox's, Jakobaleh's and one owned by a man known as Schulerberg and whom, the deputy sheriffs said, many corroborating details caused them to believe was the alleged German master spy held at San Francisco.

In Schulerberg's cabin were found 50 pounds of high percentage dynamite, fuses and detonating caps, the officers reported.

This cabin was well concealed and in an out of the way place, seldom visited by anyone except rangers. "H," the woman in the case, according to the alleged statement to the deputies, frequently visited Jakobaleh and Schulerberg in the canyon cabins and it was over her that Jakobaleh and Knox quarreled Christmas night, Wednesday, Jakobaleh was found dead.

Many persons, some of them waiters in Los Angeles, were said to have visited Schulerberg, according to persons living along the canyon trail. These persons also, according to the deputy sheriffs, corroborated details of the case.

BIG WINDOWS ARE QUITE EXPENSIVE PLAYTHINGS

Christ Anderson Amuses Himself by Sticking His Boot Through Glass.

Big windows are expensive playthings. Christ Anderson conceived the sport of kicking out one in the Hazeltine block, 433 South Arizona street, yesterday afternoon, and was arrested on a charge of disturbing the peace.

When Judge P. J. Whitty, in police court this morning, asked whether Anderson had arranged to pay the damage, he objected.

"They want too much—\$10 for just a little window."

A bill for replacing a glass 48 by 54 inches totalling \$10.50 convinced the court, however, and Anderson had to promise to pay it before he obtained his release.

"SILVER THAW" CAUSES DAMAGE IN WEST

Bellingham, Wash., Dec. 28.—Half a dozen towns were in darkness last night, orchards have been ruined and telephone and telegraph service north of this city is paralyzed as a result of a "silver thaw" which has held the Northwestern part of Whatcom county in its grip for the past two days.

For three nights of telephone poles and trees have been snapped off by the weight of the accumulated ice. The towns of Lynden, Maple Falls, Glacier, Kendall and Deming were without lights last night. There has been heavy rainfall in Bellingham, but no freezing temperature has been recorded since Tuesday.

CHECKING NAMES OF ALL SLACKERS

Captain Stewart of Helena is Verifying Lists of Erring Registrants.

Captain Stewart, brother to Governor Stewart and a member of the adjutant general's staff, is busy in Butte today checking over the records of the two local draft boards to find out the total number of deserters and slackers and to verify these lists before they are turned over to government secret service agents. Captain Stewart worked all morning at the joint board offices. He expects to return to Helena this afternoon. No figures from the two local boards were made public.

It seems improbable that men will be called for physical examination before the end of next week. Local members of the draft boards, although without official notification, believe that it will be the middle of February before a second-draft quota is ordered to the training camp.

According to a letter received last night from Provost Marshal General Crowder there will be no call for the increments of men still due under the first draft until such time as the second draft men are sent to training camps. The provost marshal's letter follows:

"It has been decided there will be no formal call for deferred percentages of the present quota before Feb. 15. While boards should, until they have enough men finally classified in class one, send forward promptly men selected under the old regulations to make up deficiencies in calls already made. The result of this decision will be that we shall be able to give the benefit of the new classification system to all men whose order numbers are so late as to place them within the deferred percentages of the present call.

"Call will, however, be made very shortly under the provision of section 149 for the special class of men there mentioned."
