FRESNO VALLEY

Communication from Mrs. Chas. Bigelow, now in Sunny California.

Editor Searchlight:
 We have settled at Fresno, Cal. for the time being. This is a great country, every thing is green, flowers in blossom, trees loaded with oranges. It is very warm. We have a large six-room house and have a small No. 7 stove and the house is plenty warm all over. It has rained a great deal since we came but mostly at night. The sun shines nice in the morning and by night it will be raining. People who have lived here some years say this is an uncommon winter for this place.

Groceries and house rent is about like Culbertson but dry goods and shoes are very cheap.

Fresno is a very pretty city, every one tells us that it is the place for a man with limited means.

The land is all irrigated here. Raisin grapes, peaches and oranges are the principal fruits. All kinds of vegetables grow in abundance. The vegetable man comes here every morning with all kinds of fresh vegetables. We buy oranges for 8 cents per dozen and eat them in place of so much meat. There are some beautiful buildings here. I do not know the population. The streets are paved for miles. Street cars and electric lights all over the city. The streets are so wide and clean. In nearly every yard there is an orange tree and some of the most beautiful palm trees. The schools are first class. We had to get the children vaccinated before we could send them to school.

It is warm as summer but we have to have a little fire in the house on account of the rain. They tell us February will be lovely.

U. S. SENATORS

Donlan's Bill for Direct Elections by the Voters Likely to Pass.

Helena, Jan. 18.—Donlan's direct primary measure, known as Senate Bill No. 9, held the board in the senate this afternoon and after a spirited fight along party lines was placed on the general file, which is the first step towards passage following the favorable report of the committee. The committee on privileges and election reported on the bill and recommended that the bill as amended pass.

Senator Long of Flathead county, demagogue, brought in a minority report, recommending that action on the bill be indefinitely postponed. Senator Meyer of Carbon moved as a substitute motion to that of Long that the majority report of the committee be adopted. On vote Meyer's motion was carried, all of the republicans voting for the adoption of the majority report and all of the democrats voting against it.

Donlan's bill differs materially from the Oregon law to which the democrats are pledged. According to the Oregon law the legislature is bound to elect a United States senator in accordance with the vote of the majority of the electors of all counties. Donlan's bill provides for the electors, and by it the democrats claim that a legislature of one political complexion might choose a senator of its own party, even though the majority of the electors through the state had preferred one of the opposite party.
