

ALL DEPORTED

Major Samuel Walker of Havre Departs Last of Swain Family — A Remarkable Case.

Major Samuel Walker, immigration inspector of Havre, returned home this week from Lethbridge, Canada having concluded his labors in the Swain case by the putting of Mrs. Alex Swain back on Canadian soil, says the Havre Plaindealer.

The case is unparalleled in the records of the federal court of the United States and for that reason has been given wide publicity in the eastern press, particularly that of Chicago. Mrs. Swain because of wild dissipation, is a pitiful wreck upon the sea of humanity; yet it requires no great stretch of the imagination to understand how this woman was once fascinatingly irresistible in her charms, for despite a profligate life, there yet remain some traces of her pristine charms, and in her sober moments—which are few—the flashes of conversation bespeak a mind highly cultivated and enriched from study.

A little more than a quarter of a century ago a young woman covered with honors graduated from the St. Louis convent, Saskatchewan province, Canada. She was a beautiful girl, having all the go and brilliancy of the French and with but a dash of Indian blood in her veins. But it was enough to eternally call her to the love of the wild. Upon leaving the walls of her convent home met Swain, a wild spirit in a wild country, and falling in love with him, they were married and began a gypsy life. Since then she has known no home. They have wandered all over Canada, and through the northern part of Montana, migrating like ducks. From the union four daughters were born, and they were cursed with their mother's comeliness and her spirit of adventure. Feeding an appetite that came to her through the aboriginal blood, Mrs. Swain sank in the human scale to depths below human comprehension. Her daughters she trained in the black art of crime and they proved to be apt pupils. From their earnings the old woman saved her appetite for liquor.

Almost a year ago Major Walker had his attention attracted to the family, and he began work on the case. Different members of the family were arrested, prosecuted and convicted. John Schlitz, an American, had one of her daughters, and he was placed under arrest and given a jail sentence. After his release he went to Canada and married the woman and tried to bring her back into this country and conferring the rights of an American citizen upon her, but the federal authorities refused even then to give the girl admittance to America.

Mrs. Swain converses fluently in a number of languages, speaking French, German, English, Spanish and several Indian tongues.

Because of the importance of the case Major Walker has received much favorable publicity, and he has been entitled to it all, for he had his official pathway beset with difficulties, but he has modestly borne his honors, and with the reticence that seems to pervade the service has refrained from giving the case any publicity.



TARIFF RATES

Interior Towns Will Stand Together for Lower Freight Rates in the Future.

The action of the Helena Commercial club in adopting resolutions asking congress to give the interstate commerce commission more power and memorializing the law-making branch of the government to make an appropriation to be used in valuing the railroads, was in line with the action taken at Spokane, a policy to be followed by all interior cities. The decision of the commerce commission in the Spokane case is of as great importance to the cities in Montana as it is to those in Washington, and there are indications that all the interior towns are going to stand together.

The Spokane decision was not unfair to the railroads. The commission held that "it is of first importance that our railroad service should be efficient, for just in proportion as it is inadequate, industry must suffer and commerce languish. If the present system of private ownership is to be continued, sufficient inducement must be extended to private investors."

The commission found that between 1891 and 1907, inclusive, the Great Northern accumulated surplus earnings of \$61,000,000. That is to say, it has rolled up this enormous sum in addition to operating expenses, interest on its bonds, seven percent dividends "paid on many millions of stock issued without any money consideration," and vast sums taken out of its earnings and put into improvements, the purchase of immensely valuable terminals and the increase of its rolling stock.

The commission directs attention to the significant fact these enormous sums were rolled up by the Great Northern, over an extended period which included the financial panics and hard times of 1893 and 1907. The Northern Pacific has had even fatter pickings. Between 1895 and 1907, inclusive, it amassed the gigantic surplus of \$55,000,000 in excess of operating expenses, interest on its bonds, taxes, the payment of big dividends on its stocks and vast sums paid out in the reconstruction of its lines and the increase of its rolling stock. The Northern Pacific within the ten years was converted from a poorly built railroad to one of the best and most modern systems in the United States.

If, as the railroads contend, says the Spokesman-Review, they earn very little profit on the long haul to the terminals, it must follow that these excessive earnings have been taken from the people of the interior. The interstate commerce commission could reach no other conclusion and rendered a decision ordering the railroads to moderate their excessive charges to Spokane and other interior points.—Helena Record.
