Must pay for Newspapers

The following is a synopsis of the United States supreme court decision regarding delinquent subscribers:

- 1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to renew their subscriptions.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publisher may continue to send until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodical from the postoffice they are responsible until after they have settled their bills and ordered their paper discontinued.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publisher and papers are sent to former addresses, subscribers are responsible.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take periodicals from the office or moving or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice at the end of the time if they do not want to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it, and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.

MONTANA WILL EXHIBIT

Will Try for the \$1,500 Trophy at the National-Corn Exposition at Omaha.

Methods of dry farming by the use of which Montana grains meet the world beaters in the grain markets of the world and beat them, will be shown in a comprehensive exhibit being prepared by the Montana Agricultural college to more than 200,000 farmers of the west and middle west in December. Prof. Alfred Atkinson has been placed in charge and will take the exhibit to Omaha where it will be shown at the National Corn Exposition. The Exposition is attended each year by about 200,000 farmers—the very farmers too who might be attracted by such an exhibit to sell their farms in the older agricultural states and take up some of the famous dry farming lands of Montana.

Some twenty-five states are to have exhibits at Omaha and a list of premiums aggregating \$50,000 is offered besides some special prizes. For instance the Colorado grain growers offer a \$1,500 trophy for the best sample of oats. This trophy may be won by Montana. When the judges see some of the sixty day oats grown in this state, running from fifty to eighty bushels per acre and weighing from thirty eight to fifty-two pounds to the bushel, the oats from the irrigated districts of Colorado will find rivals from Montana.

When James J. Hill offered special prizes at the National Corn Exposition for products from Montana, it was with the expectation that the state would make an exhibit and a large number of farmers who could individually win the prizes in gold offered by him. Sixty-three prizes are offered by Mr. Hill and he will transport free of expense from Montana to Omaha, all exhibits of Montana farmers which are taken to stations on the Great Northern railroad. It is likely the Northern Pacific and Burlington lines will do the same thing, which will make it possible for a large number of Montana farmers to stand behind their state exhibit by making individual exhibits.

MURDERED FOR ONE DOLLAR

Crime Committed in Lewistown Saloon Slayer Was After Another at the Time.

Lewistown, Sept. 28.—Roy Short, one of the best known horsemen in the state, was shot and killed Monday night by Peter C. Robison, at the Gold Bar saloon. Short went into the place with a friend and a little later Robison chanced to enter for a drink. He was owing Short a dollar and the latter asked him to pay it. Robison said he would sometime, and Short called him some names, and once, when Robison was making a reply, placed his hand over Robison's mouth. That was about all the trouble, and a moment later Short asked Robison to join him and a friend in a drink, but this was pleasantly declined. Robison went back toward the rear of the saloon and then quickly returning, commenced firing when he reached Short, who was standing with both hands on the bar. Short threw up his hands, but Robison continued shooting and fired four shots as Short was running from the place, one bullet piercing the heart. Short reached the door and fell dead on the sidewalk.

After his arrest Robison stated that the man he started out after was not Short, but ex-Mayor George W. Cook, one of the most prominent men in the county. It seems that Robison, who is a contracting carpenter, a few years ago gave his wife a deed to some main street property. She sold it to Cook, and Robison, claiming that he had merely given his deed in trust, sued Mr. Cook. He lost in the courts, and has ever since cherished bitter enmity toward Cook, having frequently threatened to kill him.

It is considered certain from Robison's own statements that he was out to kill Mr. Cook, but chanced to have this altercation with Short. The deceased leaves a widow and daughter. Robison's wife and daughter have been living in Seattle for some time. The coroner's jury found that the killing was felonious. Robison is charged with murder and an information will be filed direct.
