around the country.


N. Christensen of Dagmar has been in

**Notice to Automobile
Drivers.**
At a regular meeting of the Board of
County Commissioners of Valley County,
Montana, held on the 31st day of June,
1910, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, "That in behalf of the safety
of public travel and the proper provisions
of county bridges, all automobile drivers
and those owning and operating auto-
mobiles, shall be deemed to be and are hereby
declared subject to the provisions of section
1383 of the Political Code of the State of
Montana, relative to riding or driving over
bridges faster than a walk, and that notice
be published to the effect that all auto-
mobile owners and drivers be required to ob-
serve the requirements of the statutes in
crossing any and all bridges in Valley
County, and that the proper officers of the
law are requested to see that this is prop-
erly enforced; that the penalty for violating
this law is Five Dollars fine for each and
every offense."
