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FLOUR MILL IS NEEDED

With Montana wheat averaging 28.7 bushels to the acre for the past ten years and bright prospects of a large increase in the production next year many opportunities are now awaiting parties who are acquainted with the flour milling industry. In Custer county at a rough estimate, there are 9,600,000 acres of land, about 2,750,000 acres being valley lands, with a rich soil and possible of irrigation 2,750,000 acres of bench lands, and 4,000,000 acres of rougher lands, which can be used for grazing purposes. Of this amount there is about 1,900,000 acres of government land yet remaining unsettled, which when settled on will produce from 20 to 40 bushels of wheat to the acre. The yield of this grain in Custer county has been from 30 to 40 bushels to the acre and in this part of the county many farmers have realized more than that. A good flour mill located at

Ekalaka would beyond any question or doubt be an investment which would reward the promoters to no small extent. Within the next two years hundreds of new settlers will be flocking into this section of the country and we predict that within a few years these settlers will raise wheat enough to keep a flour mill running at its full capacity all the time. Winter wheat is almost a sure crop in this section and a grain which by experiment, has proven to be easily raised.

Let some of our boosters look into the matter of securing this new enterprise.


