**Railroads?**  
A levy of Milwaukee railroad "brass collars" recently visited in Rapid City and the Black Hills without disclosing any especial reason for the trip, and all the newspapers thereabouts have since been making a lot of extension talk, and they (the newspapers) insist on running the line down the Little Missouri valley.—Range Gazette.

The last issue of the Rapid City Guide contained the following:  
"There are many significant features of late which tend to the belief that the Milwaukee railroad system will extend its line of railroad at a very early date from Rapid City. The report has been going the rounds for several days this week to the effect that a twenty-stall round house is to be erected at Chamberlain, S. D. This is in-

dicative in railroad circles as a surety and positive proof that the coast extension will be started without delay. Under present conditions of business in this city, which is the western terminus in South Dakota, a two-stall round house would be nearer the requirements than a twenty-stall structure for the housing of their locomotives at Chamberlain.

"The news of the construction of the large round house comes from an authentic source which is fully worthy of belief.

"Railroad men who are well posted on matters which pertain to railroad affairs in this section of the country are inclined to the belief and opinion that the extension will go north from Rapid City, passing near Sturgis or Fort Meade and cross the Northwestern line near Newell and thence in a northwesterly direction along Indian Creek to the southeast corner of Montana and down the Little Missouri river, connecting with the main line at either Marmarth, N. D., or at Miles City, Mont.

"It is also believed the extension from Mobridge which now reaches Faith, S. D., in the northeast corner of Meade county, will be continued to strike the Rapid City extension some place near Sturgis.

"The labor employment agencies at Omaha, Chicago and Kansas City, are making arrangements to provide ample labor for the Milwaukee extension to the coast which will mean much for Rapid City."—Marmarth Mail.
