Little Talks on Diversified Farming

Silage is made from corn in the same manner that kraut is made from cabbage. The best silage is made from corn which is in the hard dough stage. It is run through a cutter which chops it into pieces an inch long and these are run into an air-tight bin called a silo. The chopped green corn heats and ferments in the bin but cannot get out as it does not get air. The heating cooks the corn and renders much of the stalk digestible which otherwise would be of no value.

Now is the time to start work on a pit silo. If the farmer does the work himself, a good pit silo can be made for a cash outlay of \$40.00. We will assist free of charge, as many farmers in Eastern Montana as possible who wish to make pit silos. Write to M. L. Wilson at Miles City if you are interested.

The best winter wheat that I have seen so far this year was drilled last fall in a corn field. The corn was checked, cultivated both ways, and was free from weeds.

The wheat was drilled with a one horse drill in August. In September the corn was out and checked. It was Rustler's White Dent and yielded 34 bushels of sound dry corn per acre.

### Entrywoman May Marry

A recent act of congress specifies that a homestead entrywoman may get married and choose to live on either one of the homesteads without jeopardizing the homestead which they have created. It is necessary however for the contracting parties to have complied with the homestead law for a period of at least one year previous to the date of their marriage. The ruling applies only when final proof has not been made by either party.

## 300 VOTES CUT OFF

From the North End of Fallon County if Wibaux County is Created.

Registration closed Wednesday for the special election to be held August 1st for the creation of Wibaux County and the election of county officers thereof. The boundary line through Fallon County cuts off approximately five precincts, the number of voters in the portions of these precincts that are segregated being as follows:

Precinct 26, 28 voters.
" 27, 60 "
" 28, 66 "
" 29, 95 "
" 30, 51 "

This makes 300 registered voters in the north end of Fallon county that will be cut off in case the Wibaux proposition goes through.

It seems to be an assured fact that the proposed division will be made and the new county of Wibaux created. As to the officers The Wibaux Pioneer says that it is the intention of the various parties to put the tickets in the field on a non-partisan basis so as to eliminate all personal and political strife and concentrate the attention of the voters on the main issue.
