## DEMOCRATS GATHER

At the County Seat Tuesday.  
State and National Plat-  
form Endorsed

The democratic central committee of Fallon County met pursuant to a call of the chairman and secretary at Ekalaka Tuesday and transacted considerable business in connection with the coming primary and general elections.

Committeemen were appointed for the various precincts that were without representation since the creation of Fallon county and a sound and safe democratic organization was organized. The meeting was represented from all over Fallon county and everything passed off in a very enthusiastic manner.

The following resolution was read and adopted:-

Be It Resolved, THAT the democratic central committee and members of the democratic party of Fallon County, Montana duly assembled, hereby endorse the last National and State Democratic platform and the well known principles of the democratic party and especially do we endorse the present democratic administration, both national and state and the president of the United States, Woodrow Wilson, through whose earnest efforts upon behalf of the people, together with the democratic congress, great progress has been made in restoring privileges to the people. That more reforms have been inaugurated in less than two years democratic rule than innumerable republican administrations that

had preceded it. The money trust has been stricken by the reform currency legislation, and that the people are being restored to the privilege for which many years they have been robbed by the republican mis-rule, that these reforms have been drastic but no more greater than the situation required, and have taken place with as little disturbance of business conditions as is possible in any great reform. We observe that it appears that the republican and progressive parties exist chiefly for the purpose of villifying each other. In county affairs we endorse a policy of economy and extreme caution in the expenditure of public funds. We favor the expenditures for roads to be made on permanently laid out lines throughout all portions of the county. We further endorse the present democratic officers of Fallon county for the efficient services on behalf of the people, and bespeak the united support for all democratic nominees for national, state and county officers at the coming election.

## EKALAKA BOOSTERS

Celebrate the Fourth in Two  
States.—Big Time at  
Alzada

Ekalaka, represented by eleven auto loads of boosters took in the celebration at Camp Crook, S. D., last Friday and the big one at Alzada Saturday. In the delegation from here was the base ball team, the band and a real live bunch of boosters. At Camp Crook the local base ball team crossed bats with the Crook boys, the final score ending 11 to 7 in favor of the Montanan's. The game was indeed one long to be remembered, especially as for as excitement was concerned. At several times during the progress of the game the umpires, of which there were two, were called upon to call "time," in order that Manager Dolan and his recruits might appear before the the footlights and express themselves as being utterly disgusted with the way the game was going. At one time Dolan had ordered his Dakota boys to quit but owing to public opinion was obliged to continue the game. The Ekalaka boys walked away with the big end of the purse and also considerable loose change.

At Alzada the Ekalaka boys tangled up with the Belle Fourche S. D. team and were trimmed to the tune of 10 to 3. The Belle Fourche boys put up an excellent game and at no time was there any dispute or wrangling over decisions. Had it not been for the fact that the Ekalaka boys had traveled most of the night in order to reach Alzada the result of the game might not have been so bad as it really was but for ourselves we no not consider that at any time had we the material to give them defeat. The Alzada celebration was far above what we had expected from our southern friends. Horse racing, foot races, broncho busting and many other sports were pulled off. A big dance was the feature in the evening. The band boys from Ekalak gave a short concert in the evening at the hall. The speaker of the day, Jhon Oliver of Ekalaka, delivered a very strong and impressive address at the pavilion provided for the visitors. It was estimated at Alzada that some seven hundred visitors attended their celebration which will always be remembered as one full of life ginger and lots of excitement. In return for our liberal turnout at their big doings the Alzada boys are coming to Ekalaka this fall full steam.
