Little Talks on Diversified Farming

Fall rye when seeded early; from Aug. 1st to 15th and not later than Sept. 1st, makes excellent fall and spring pasture.

J. A. Hawks who lives 12 miles south of Wibaux has a splendid crop of rye this year, of which he says: "Last year I seeded two fields of rye, one Sept. 1st and one Sept. 15th. The early seeded field was not fenced and about 50 head of range cattle grazed on it all fall. It was grazed and tramped off so close that one would hardly believe there ever had been any crop seeded. Nevertheless it came on this spring and made a better crop than the late seeded field. It will stand more hardship in the way of close grazing, severe freezing and drouth than any crop I know of. Ground and judiciously fed it is an excellent hog feed."
