TOM STOUT'S LETTER

Washington, D. C., August 18.—It occurs to me that if there is to be any humor extracted from a most tragic situation, the esteemed congress of the United States is these days in a position to give the laugh to certain and sundry citizens who for several months past have been devoting their spare time to berating the aforementioned congress of the U. S. A. and imploring it to shut up shop and go home. These same gentlemen are now fairly besieging the congress to remain in session until a lot of measures for their own

and the nation's relief are enacted into law and are gravely advancing most weighty arguments in support of their hastily reformed view that all thoughts of adjournment should be cast aside.

For several years it has been a favorite pastime with some of our facetious friends of the press to poke fun at congress. To read their stuff one would be brought to the conclusion that this country would be infinitely better served if congress never convened and the country's true destiny be attained if the law making body of our government could be altogether annihilated. It made fine reading for the thoughtless and won for some of our hard-working, deserving members of the literary well earned reputations as genuine cut-ups and regular wits.

But congress is having its inning just at the present time and a number of our most popular humorists are minus the inspiration for their daily dose of quips and quarks. Even these self constituted regulators of correct congressional deportment have been compelled to admit that, during the last couple of weeks congress has been a mighty handy little, old institution to have around. The thought has even been borne home to the most frolicsome of these intensely intellectual individuals that had congress followed their sage advice and adjourned back last April or May, there would have been the necessity for an extra session and while the members were assembling in response to such a call a lot of precious time would have been lost before several very necessary measures could have been made into law.

Among those who thought we should have adjourned several weeks ago are a lot of captains of industry. They, for weeks, filled the atmosphere with lamentations because business was being disturbed by reason of congress remaining in session. To have heard them talk prior to two weeks ago, one could only have thought that congress is an institution designed chiefly for the purpose of harassing them in their noble efforts to keep the ship of State headed in the direction of peace, prosperity and contentment. There is no disguising the fact that most of the members are tired, they would like to knock off, call it a day and go home, partly to engage in campaigns for reelection, but chiefly, I believe, to rest up and get in shape for the next session which will convene the first of December. But all now realize that any day may bring some mighty serious tasks to perform and are patriotically willing to remain here prepared to do whatever the exigencies of these stressful times may demand. They feel that the people of the country will feel easier in the knowledge that the legislative branch of the government is all ready to aid the President in taking care of our people and their best interests at this time.
