EXCELLENT PROSPECTS FOR BIG COUNTY FAIR

Association Committees Report Progress. Big Crowd is Expected. Grandstand Nearly Completed

That the Fallon County Fair and Race Meet will be exceptionally successful this year, both from the standpoint of those in attendance and the association, becomes more and more apparent as the time of the big show draws near.

The arrangements committees and the heads of the various departments are working overtime perfecting the details of the racing program, the stock show, the exhibits and the special entertainment features.

Mr. Shaw, who has charge of the exhibits for the county fair and also those for the state fair from this district, is busy these days preparing grains, grasses, etc., for exhibition. He says the display products are coming in fast and from present indications

the agricultural exhibit this year will far surpass any that has been shown here.

The attendance this year promises to establish a new record, as many neighboring towns have expressed their intention of sending big delegations.

The new grandstand is nearing completion and will be ready by fair time. The contract has been let for the widening of the race track and this work will be done immediately and the track put in first class condition.

Don't forget the dates, September 14th and 15th. And don't forget that Monte Rolfe, the boy birdman, will make a thrilling aeroplane flight. He is going to do the Dare devil Dive, the Ocean Wave and the Spiral Glide. This feature alone will be worth the price of admission.

Oil Boom At Baker

A heavy flow of gas was opened at Baker last Tuesday when well drillers were boring for water on the Munro place about a mile north of that town. The gas was found at a depth of one thousand feet.

It is believed that the discovery of gas indicates the presence of oil and the drillers are going on down in the expectation that the precious fluid will be uncovered.

Experts from several big oil companies are on the field and the territory is being explored in every direction. Great excitement has prevailed since the discovery of the gas and a large number of mining claims have been staked in the vicinity of the well.

Good Yields Reported

Farmers who are threshing their grain are reporting excellent yields all over the country. Good, heavy grain and lots of it is the answer to the question, "How's crops?"

Clark Boggs, who is running a threshing rig and has worked over the country west of Ekalaka, says the smallest wheat yield he has encountered so far is 25 bu. to the acre, while Carlos Hall topped the market with a forty acre field of Turkey Red fall wheat that ran 42 bushels. Oats that he has run through his machine have gone from 60 to 100 bushels to the acre. Rye threshed out from 15 to 35 bushels the latter run being from Earl Pickering's field.

Other vicinities are reporting similar good yields and excellence of grain.

TO BUILD ELEVATOR

Work Will Start Next Week on 30,000 Bushel Elevator at Ekalaka

L. R. Rolfe, who has been in town for the past two days from Baker, announces that all details have been completed for the construction of a grain elevator in Ekalaka and that building will commence as soon as arrangements can be made for lumber, probably next week. Jack Pratt of Willard will have charge of the construction.

The elevator will be 26 feet square and will have bins 60 feet deep. It will have a capacity of 30,000 bushels. This will be the first building to be constructed by the Ekalaka Milling company. Later there will be built a flour mill, warehouse and office buildings. It is planned to have the mill in operation in the fore part of November, by which time Mr. Rolfe says the wheat will have time to dry and cure sufficiently for grinding.

It is estimated that the elevator will be completed and ready for use by Oct. 1st, so that the farmers hereabouts may safely figure that they can sell this year's grain at home, rather than make the long haul to the railroad.
