His Letter To The Voters of Fallon County

Ladies and Gentlemen:--

I desire the nomination on the Republican ticket as a candidate for the House of Representatives. If nominated, rest assured, I can be elected, and, if elected, I can be of real service to you in the Legislature. You know the fight I've had and that I fought fair even though many for whom I've fought have not been worthy of my fight for them. I cannot afford the money necessary to make an extensive campaign. I have no slush fund. I cannot see you all in person, but when I see you I will show you my appreciation of your support. You know for what I've stood. I stand for a still better Fallon County. Men secretly oppose me because I will not join any "gang" for exploitation.
