COLORADO MINING AND SMELTING COMPANY.

THIS COMPANY was first organized in 1879 as the Colorado and Montana company, and in 1883 was re-incorporated under its present name. The plant is located immediately on the line of the Montana Union railroad and is about three miles distant from the city of Butte. The buildings, which are all of frame, cover an area of about two and one-half acres, are fitted with all the most approved appliances that can be obtained for the purposes for which they are designed. There are in the plant four reverberatory furnaces, six calciners and thirty kilns for roasting, and these are worked uninterruptedly, night and day, producing an average of five tons of matte per day. A concentrating department is worked for the low grade ores and the output from it is about eighty-one tons per day.

The only improvement of special note made to the plant during the year was a system of electric lights.

The pay-roll shows that sixty-five men are employed, and with but few exceptions they live upon the premises. General Manager Henry Williams also has a fine residence near the works. The ores treated are both silver and copper, and the matte, which is produced at the works, is shipped to the Argo works at Denver for reduction. The company own and operate the famous Gagnon mine and a group in Independence district known as the Burlington group. In the works both wood and coal are used. Wood is supplied by a ditch from Basin Gulch, twenty miles distant, and it is landed directly at the smelter. Rock Springs is the coal that is in use. There is a large amount of custom ore treated, mostly from this vicinity, all of copper and silver formation. The aggregate output for the past year is \$850,000. The property of the company is situated most eligibly, and is very valuable. In addition to the works proper, there is a fine office and assay department and the usual adjuncts in the shape of stables, blacksmith shop, carpenter shop and other needed buildings.

The officers of the company are N. P. Hill, president; W. A. Clark, vice-president; H. R. Wolcott, secretary and treasurer; Henry Williams, manager, and C. W. Goodale, agent of the mining department.
