

WILL ENTER MONTANA PRIMARIES.

United States Senator John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, has consented to the use of his name on the Montana primary ballot as a Republican presidential candidate. Senator Weeks is a graduate of Annapolis, and favors an increased army and navy. He is a trained business man, favors a protective tariff, and is opposed to increased federal bureaucracy. He took a prominent part in the creation of the postal savings bank system, and was author of the federal law for the protection of migratory insectivorous birds, which is popular with the farmers and conservationists. He is conceded the support of practically the entire Missouri delegation at the Chicago convention, and
