

**CARRANZA'S NOTE QUESTIONS GOOD FAITH OF AMERICA**

CONTAINS THREAT OF ARMED RESISTANCE AND DEMANDS WITHDRAWAL OF U. S. TROOPS FROM MEXICO.

**SECOND EXPEDITION IS CONSIDERED AN INVASION**

Crossing of Border After Columbus Incident Without Consent of De Facto Government is Termed a Mistake—Trouble Declared Due to U. S. Attitude.

Washington, June 2.—General Carranza's latest note, bluntly questioning the good faith of the United States government and with a threat of armed resistance, demanding withdrawal of American troops from Mexico, was presented at the state department by Eliseo Arredondo, the Mexican ambassador designate. Later a translation of the voluminous document, about 12,000 words long, was laid before President Wilson, who at once began considering how it should be answered.

Not Able to Protect Border. High officials said the de facto government, so far, had failed utterly to demonstrate its ability to protect the border against bandits, and expressed the opinion that the troops would stay in Mexico until this was done.

It was suggested that the belligerent and uncompromising tone assumed by Carranza was largely for effect on the Mexican public and there was little disposition to believe that the de facto government actually contemplated an effort to expel the American army by force.

No Permission to Cross Line. The note recites that the American troops crossed the border after the Columbus incident without the permission of the Mexican government.

The act was not considered one of invasion then solely because the United States said they had misinterpreted the attitude of the Mexican government. When the second expedition crossed the line after the Glenn Springs incident, the note maintains, the plea that this was done with the consent of the Mexican consul at Del Rio, Texas, is untenable and that act can only be considered as one of invasion.

Asks Immediate Recall. "The Mexican government therefore invites the United States to bring to an end this unsupportable situation," the note concludes, and to support its protestations and declarations of friendship by an immediate withdrawal of American troops.

"The American government," the note says, "has admitted that the work of the expedition which entered after the Columbus raid is now over. But in spite of this fact American troops will remain on Mexican soil."

Blames United States. The note points out that much of the trouble in Mexico is "due to the attitude of the United States in not punishing conspirators in the United States who have plotted the downfall of the present Constitutional government and to acts of Washington in refusing to permit the shipment of arms and ammunition to enter Mexico."

**MOST OFFENSIVE NOTE EVER SENT TO UNITED STATES**

Tone of Note From Carranza Demanding Withdrawal is Surprise to Washington Officials.

Washington, June 2.—American troops will not be withdrawn from Mexico until Carranza authorities demonstrate control of the situation sufficient to protect the American border. This, it has been authoritatively stated, will be President Wilson's reply to a 12,000-word note from General Carranza demanding immediate withdrawal of United States forces from Mexican soil.

Note is Offensive. While official comment is withheld, it is understood the tone of the document is regarded as decidedly offensive and certain portions of it, such as the thinly veiled accusation that the president is playing domestic politics in retaining the troops in Mexico, may draw a sharp rebuke.

It is doubtful, according to authorities on the international correspondence of the United States, if the government ever has received a communication couched in such offensive terms and containing as many apparent violations of the ordinary uses of diplomatic courtesy.

**Texas Guard to Recruit.**

San Antonio, Texas, May 31.—Authorization from the war department has been obtained to recruit those units of the Texas militia now in the federal service to war strength. Recruiting agents will be sent to the towns where the various companies were organized and there the people will be given the first opportunity to enroll those lacking to bring each company to 150 men. It is expected the plan will add to the forces along the border approximately 1,500 men.
