The republican party has come back and made a bid for popular favor as a unified, virile and enthusiastic political organization. A sane, scholarly and keen-visioned man has been nominated for President. The progressive party was slipping fast before the Chicago gathering. Now it will melt more rapidly. One or two noisy and chesty leaders will utter brave words about the survival of the party and then sink to obscurity. The fight is on between the ancient rivals. It will be no small boy's job to disengage Mr. Wilson from the Presidency, not because of his accomplishments but because he is "in." To be sure he is weakening. The Mexican situation is a sore thorn in his flesh, his protegee, Carranza, having turned to taunt him. His Mexican mistakes are his worst, but his foreign policy as a whole is replete with indcision. Yet Wilson will make a titan fight for reelection. He's a word wizard and can gloss over many administration follies with his pretty phraseology. Personally both Wilson and Hughes are Americans of the very highest type and there will not be the slightest occasion for offensive personalities.

Bashful Candidates

Aspirants for public office in this part of Montana seem to have evolved a very happy philosophy in relation to the primary law. They appear to assume that after they have filed for office there is little else to do but place petitions in the hands of friends and then sit back and wait for election day. It is certain that some of the candidates will be chosen, not, perhaps, because they are preferred by the voters but because the bewildered elector will pick at random a name out of a list of aspirants for each of the offices to be filled, feeling that since he knows none of them, one guess is as good as another. Sometimes personal acquaintance is a detriment, but this is not the rule. The stay-at-home candidate is brother to the non-advertising merchant; the public doesn't know whether he wants its favors or no. We'll place our bet on the man who does not play the part of the shrinking violet after announcing his candidacy for public office.

Almost Complete Absence of Serious Criminal Cases In Superior Court Attributed to Prohibition Law.

For the first time in eighteen years, the criminal docket for the June term of the King County superior court contained but one felony charge.

Prosecuting attorney Alfred H. Lundin said that the unusual absence of felony charges was due entirely to the prohibition statute and its vigorous enforcement by the combined city and county authorities. There are today in the county jail and stockade eighty-six prisoners. One year ago there were confined 251 men.
