SAYS HYPNOTISM IS EASY EXPECT TO RAISE BIG SUM

Professor Muensterberg Declares He Can Bring Anybody He Ever Met Under Complete Subjection.

Prof. Hugo Muensterberg, the Harvard psychologist, says he can hypnotize anybody he ever met, according to a Cambridge (Mass.) dispatch to the New York Evening Telegram. He knows Kaiser Wilhelm very well, and said he would not except the Kaiser. The Harvard summer school students were told how easy it is to hypnotize anybody, almost as easy as "rolling off a log." The professor predicted a great field in the future for the expert in mind control. He said:

"Hypnotism presents a vast field for the expert. It is so easy to produce the hypnotic trance that anyone can do it on others, but it is exceedingly dangerous when thoughtlessly or ignorantly used. It is simply a case of increasing the suggestibility of the mind, and it can be used in medicine to cure the morphine fiend, the alcoholic fiend and all who have abnormal desires. Often only a slight hypnosis is necessary to effect a cure for nervous disorders.

"Medicine, equally with law, is to be the food for the psychologist of the future. Every mental trait can be measured exactly by almost perfect standards. The old methods are obsolete and the whole science of diagnosis has been carried into the field of experiment. Psycho-analysis has a great future."

Anti-Tuberculosis Societies Plan Sale of One Million Dollars' Worth of Red Cross Christmas Seals.


Three hundred million Red Cross Christmas seals are being printed in Cincinnati for the annual holiday campaign to be conducted under the joint auspices of the American Red Cross and the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

The campaign for the sale of Red Cross seals this year will be larger than ever before. Although in 1915 the sale reached the record total of 80,000,000 seals, bringing in \$800,000, it is expected that this year at least 100,000,000 seals or \$1,000,000 worth will be sold. The sale will be organized from Alaska to the Canal Zone and from Hawaii to Porto Rico. Every state and territory in the United States will have seals on sale. New organizations will be working in a number of the western states, including Montana, Utah and Wyoming. Distribution of the seals is now under way.

BIG CENTRAL SPAN OF QUEBEC BRIDGE FALLS; 25 KILLED

LARGEST CANTILEVER IN WORLD DROPS INTO ST. LAWRENCE RIVER WHILE BEING PUT INTO PLACE.

NINETY MEN ON STRUCTURE ARE HURLED INTO WATERS

Part Which Collapsed Weighs More Than 5,000 Tons and Is 640 Feet Long—Bridge Is Being Constructed at a Cost of \$17,000,000.

Quebec, Que., Sept. 12.—The new central span of the Quebec bridge, the largest cantilever suspension in the world, collapsed and fell into the St. Lawrence river while being hoisted into place with the loss of 25 lives.

The bridge was being constructed at a cost of \$17,000,000 in order to shorten the railway journey from Halifax to the Canadian Northwest by 200 miles.

The bridge stands on the site of the structure which collapsed on August 29, 1907, with a loss of 70 lives. The central span which fell weighs more than 5,000 tons and is 640 feet long.

Ninety Men Fall Into River. Observers said that the span broke in two places, one of the corners first appearing to give way, followed almost immediately by a break in the center.

The collapse occurred when the span was about 15 feet in the air. Ninety men were on the structure when it fell.

Boats from among the hundreds of spectators' craft were rushed to the spot where the span disappeared. The fallen structure sank 200 feet to the bottom of the river and engineers expressed doubts as to whether it would ever be raised.

The span had been constructed on pontoons a few miles east of the bridge and was towed into position under the gap left in the anchor arms of the structure.

AUTOISTS MEET DEATH UNDER ENGINE'S PILOT

Three Instantly Killed and Bodies Mangled in Colorado—Fourth Member of Party Dying.

Loveland, Colo., Sept. 12.—Three persons are dead and a fourth is dying as the result of an automobile accident. The automobile party of four consisting of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Hedelson and Mrs. Clara Jones of Loveland and Mrs. Julia A. Tent of Eureka, Kan., were returning from a mountain trip. At the outskirts of the city Hedelson, driving the machine, attempted to cross the Colorado and Southern railroad tracks ahead of a southbound passenger train. The car was struck squarely in the center. Mrs. Tent, fatally injured, was thrown to one side. The other three, remaining in the automobile, rolled over and over under the engine pilot, were instantly killed and their bodies mangled. Railroad employes worked desperately for over an hour before the bodies were removed from under the engine.

LONGSHOREMEN MAY STRIKE

Buffalo Society's Decision Affects Duluth Grain Men.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 12.—The Longshoremen's association of Buffalo voted to handle no more grain from boats trimmed by nonunion labor at Duluth and Superior. Action will be suspended until after a meeting of representatives and the employers. The principal complaint of the Buffalo men is that the old system of payment through a stevedore instead of direct to the men obtains at Duluth and Superior.

WILSON HELD FIRST REAL PROGRESSIVE IN DECADE

Writer Flays Theodore Roosevelt in Declaring for President—Says Colonel Is Out of Date.

New York, Sept. 12.—"Theodore Roosevelt is out of date," Ida Tarbell, magazine writer and economist, said in declaring for President Wilson. "He does not and never has fully understood what the Progressives are fussing about," Miss Tarbell added, "and there never has been one of them who could tell him so that he could get the idea."

"President Wilson is the first real Progressive this decade has produced."

Roumanians Lose Balkan War Gains. Berlin, Sept. 12.—Nearly all of the territory taken from Bulgaria by the Roumanians at the close of the second Balkan war has been reconquered by the German-Bulgarian forces. The Roumanians and Russians are again in retreat toward the Danube, abandoning still more positions. In a little more than a week the combined German and Bulgarian forces have captured far more Roumanian territory than the Allies have been able to take of German territory since the beginning of the war.

GERMANS DRIVEN BACK AT VERDUN; BATTLE NEAR END

TEUTONS ARE NOW ENTIRELY ON DEFENSIVE WHILE FRENCH STEADILY WIN BACK THEIR LOST POSITIONS.

GREAT STRUGGLE DYING LIKE EXTINCT VOLCANO

Morale of Kaiser's Troops Shattered When They Are Reduced in Numbers to Mere Defensive Garrison—Fighting On West Bank of Meuse Ceases.

With the French Army at Verdun, Sept. 11.—The Germans are now entirely on the defensive at Verdun. The great battle began 201 days ago and has entered its third and final stage. The French are steadily winning back their lost positions. The battle will gradually die out like an extinct volcano.

It now has been learned definitely that the Germans were forced to remove huge quantities of artillery and men from Verdun to the Somme front three weeks ago to meet the new Anglo-French offensive. This had an immediate effect on the morale of the remaining men.

Morale of Germans Shattered.

In February they had been told they were to capture Verdun. At the end of July they were told it would be sufficient to simply dominate the situation there. But when they had been reduced in numbers to merely a defensive garrison after nearly seven months of fighting their morale was so shattered that groups of prisoners have been surrendering, some of them going through Verdun singing "The Marseillaise," French officers declare.

The seventh and last German massed attack was made on both banks of the Meuse on July 10. The French checked this blow immediately and took the offensive. Ever since that time they have retained the initiative, capturing in their operations more than 10,000 prisoners, a score of cannon and a hundred machine guns.

For Final Desperate Struggle.

Fighting on the west bank of the Meuse has practically ceased. Hill 304 and Dead Man's hill are now numbered among the glories of the past.

East of the river the Germans are concentrating for a final desperate struggle to retain the forts of Vaux and Douaumont.

Forces of Teutonic powers in the Carpathian mountains northwest of Mount Kapul, yielded before the pressure exerted by the Russians.

SUCCESSFUL CRUISE ENDED

Navy Department Orders Training Ships to Land Men.

Washington, Sept. 11.—With announcement that the "John Paul Jones cruise" on which 2,500 civilians have been in training since August 13 has been highly successful, orders were issued Saturday by the Navy department terminating the training. The six reserve battleships comprising the training fleet will land the men at Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Norfolk, Charleston and New York.

Admiral Benson, acting secretary of the navy, said the orders were intended to relieve the civilians so they might return to their business Monday. The cruise was to have ended Tuesday.

EXPECTS NOTE FROM BRITAIN

Lansing Says Reply to Mail Seizure Protest Is Due.

Washington, Sept. 11.—The State department, Secretary Lansing says, is expecting a further note from Great Britain some time this month replying to the American protest against British seizure of and interference with American mails. Officials expect a more comprehensive discussion than that given in the preliminary note received July 20.

No information has been received at the State department as to when a reply may be expected to the American note protesting against the British blacklist decree.

Steel Soars to New Levels

New York, Sept. 11.—United States Steel common broke its previous high record price for the seventh time in three weeks, Saturday, selling at 102 1/2. Unfilled orders on the books of the company, August 31, totaled 9,660,357 tons, the monthly unfilled tonnage report showed.

List of Speeding Autoists is Stolen

Wayzata, Minn., Sept. 11.—One hundred and sixty-eight automobile owners, caught in a trap by Marshal George Strand of Wayzata, will not have to appear in court, even though they did average 20 to 35 miles an hour through the business district of the town. Strand had the names of the violators in his desk in the city hall. Then someone broke into the building and stole the list. The purse that contained the list was found outside the building. "I do not think any of the speeders stole it," said Strand.

GOOD EFFECTS OF TROUBLE

Much of the Advancement of the World May Be Traced to Those Pugnaciously Inclined.

Most of us love trouble—that is, most of the human race. Man cannot remain contentedly out of trouble for any length of time, it seems.
