

BEAUTY WEDS MILLIONS.

W. A. Clark Jr. and Miss Mabel Foster Quietly Married at Butte.

The agony is over at last and the great event of the season in social circles, the marriage of Miss Mabel Foster and W. A. Clark Jr., has taken place, the ceremony being performed last Wednesday night in Butte. Rev. S. C. Blackiston officiated, the bride's father giving her away. Both bride and groom were unattended and the whole affair was as quiet and simple as possible. Only the thirty-five relatives and some twenty most intimate friends witnessed the ceremony, but several hundred attended the general reception held afterwards. The house was elaborately decorated, the front parlors in white and green and the other first floor rooms in glowing reds. The orchestra was stationed behind a screen of smilax and roses. The bride wore an exquisite robe of Duchesse lace and white chiffon over white taffeta. She wore the conventional veil, fastened with real orange flowers and carried a shower bouquet. Her gown was made en traine and of course high neck, the corsage finished with her only ornament, a superb dog collar of immense diamonds and pearls, the gift of the bridegroom. Her sister, Mrs. Geoffrey Lauzier, acted as matron of honor and was gowned in a magnificent robe of Arabian chiffon, bright flowers woven and gleaming through the meshes; ornaments diamonds. The array of presents was truly dazzling, chests of silverware, single pieces, gold ware, antiques, marbles, cut glass, rare china and jewels, among the latter a magnificent diamond and emerald ring given by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Walker Clark. The young couple have gone east and will go to Europe, Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Clark meeting them later.

The bride is very young, not twenty and looks like a school girl, which she is. She was not graduated and was to have returned to the Pittsburg schools, and she "came out" at her engagement party.

Now that the marriage is over people are turning their thoughts, not to the Fourth of July, but to the races which are to begin the 29th. There are some magnificent strings of horses and some good jockeys, and everyone is saving their money to play the races. Speaking of the 4th, some patriotic citizens insist that there shall be a celebration and they are circulating around trying to raise the money for display of fireworks and accessories. GARVIN IS ARRESTED.

Prominent Live Stock Man of Billings Implicated in the Crow Indian Cattle Case.

Deputy United States Marshal Wall arrived today from Billings, says Monday's Helena Herald, having in custody Samuel Garvin, a prominent cattle man, who was indicted by the grand jury for alleged complicity in the theft of a large number of Indian cattle. He is a partner of Robert E. Lee, who was indicted several days ago, and who has been under \$2,000 bonds since his arrest in March.

Lee was rearrested in Billings yesterday by Deputy Marshal Wall. His bond had been increased to \$5,000. Lee was brought to Helena today.

Mr. Garvin was, up to a short time ago one of Billings' most substantial citizens. He owned many cattle and was in every way prosperous. As soon as Lee was arrested for running the Indian cattle into the mountains and altering brands, Mr. Garvin transferred all his holdings to the First National Bank, of Billings.

The section of the mountains where 1,000 head of Indian cattle with altered brands were recovered, takes its name from Mr. Garvin, being known as Garvin's basin. It is a day's ride from Billings and is a large basin 30 miles long and several wide surrounded on all sides by precipitous cliffs. There is but one entrance to the basin and this is a narrow passageway, scarcely more than 15 feet wide. Into this enclosure the stolen cattle were driven. Across the entrance to the basin was strung two heavy chains, fastened on either side by a large

hook sunk into the rock walls. The chains were locked together and it was asserted by those who testified before the grand jury at the preliminary hearing given Robert E. Lee at Billings, that Lee had threatened to shoot any one who came into the basin. Lee's house and ranch buildings were located in the basin and when the sheriff and stock inspectors went to arrest Lee, in addition to the Indian cattle they recovered, quite a number of cattle that were the property of Lee & Garvin were also seen in the basin. The case involves the theft of the largest number of cattle recorded in the state for many years. In small bunches it is said the Indian cattle were run into Garvin's basin, where they were located by the authorities. The "I D" brand was altered to read "D D."

Robert E. Lee and Samuel Garvin were arraigned before Judge Knowles Monday afternoon and released on \$5,000 bonds, signed by five prominent citizens of Billings. O. F. Goddard, who is attorney for Mr. Lee, stated that his client would plead next morning, and Mr. Garvin stated that he would procure an attorney and plead at the same time.

When Mr. Lee was arraigned he was represented by Mr. Goddard.

"I suppose you can procure a lawyer?" said the court to Mr. Garvin after he had been arraigned.

"Well, no; I have nothing. Everything I owned I turned over to the bank. I have scarcely had time to procure an attorney. I was working at Park City when I received a telephone message from the sheriff saying that he wanted to see me. I did not reach Billings until late last night and came direct to Helena. I will look around for an attorney."

Judge Knowles then accepted the bond presented by Mr. Goddard for both Garvin and Lee, ordering their release from custody until further orders.

ASKS AID OF STOCKMEN.

Experiment Station Making a Study of Poisonous Plants in Montana.

The Montana agricultural experiment station at Bozeman has issued the following notice to stockmen:

"The Montana agricultural experiment station in co-operation with the department of agriculture at Washington and the state veterinarian at Helena, is attempting during the present season to make a study of the plants poisonous to stock in this state. In order to fully determine the conditions under which this poisoning normally occurs and the plants to which it may be referred, it is desired that detailed reports be made to this station of losses now occurring, as well as any losses which may have occurred in the past, noting, as far as practicable, the exact locality in the state in which such poisoning occurred and the local conditions; whether lowland or upland; plains, foothills, or mountains; about springs or along streams; the time of the year of such poisoning; stock affected, whether horses, cattle or sheep; the number poisoned, their symptoms, and treatment pursued, as well as relative proportion of deaths; and the plants suspected, with descriptions or specimens. It is only by the compilation of such data that the dangerous zones of the state can be accurately determined, as well as the time when they must be avoided.

"By the co-operation of the stockmen of the state in this work, particularly in reporting promptly for investigation, all new cases of poisoning that may occur, it is hoped that definite results may be secured and the present loss due to this cause prevented."
