RESOLVED, That forty \$1,000 10-20 5 per cent coupon bonds be issued by the board of county commissioners of Rosebud county, Montana, on the credit of said county, for the purpose of redeeming said amount of certain warrant issued April 19th, 1901, by Rosebud county to Custer county in part payment of the share of indebtedness assumed by Rosebud county on the division of Custer county.

Resolution is adopted by all members voting "yes."

Thos. E. Hammond moves that the clerk be instructed to advertise for bids for the sale of forty one thousand dollar 10-20 5 per cent bonds as described in resolution adopted July 20, 1901, and to notify state treasurer of such action, and ask the state land board to waive their right to said bonds if a better price can be obtained.

SHEEP WAR ON LISCOM CREEK

Indignant Ranchers Stampede a Herd of Horses Through Wolf's Band of Sheep, Killing and Maiming Hundreds.

Wm. Wolff, a sheep man who has been ranging his sheep on the upper Tongue river, has been having all sorts of trouble of late with ranchers in that neighborhood. Wolff was recently defendant in a damage suit brought by W. C. McDowell for ranging his sheep on McDowell's land, and the latter was given a judgment against him for \$700 or \$800. He has since been ranging his band elsewhere, but like the Wandering Jew, has been compelled to move on, forever seeking new pastures.

Last week Wolff had his sheep on Liscom creek, and their presence aroused the indignation of some of the ranchers in that section. His herders were notified to move on several times, but either obeying instructions from their employer, or believing they had a right to the range, they paid no attention to the admonition to get out. One night during the latter part of last week Wolff's sheep were moved by unknown parties. The moving of the flock was very informal and quite disastrous to the sheep.

Late in the night as the sheep were at rest and the herder lying on his blanket indulging in reminiscent thoughts over his last trip to town the camp was startled by a stampede of horses making straight for the herd. The animals were driven by mounted men and dashed through the frightened and bewildered sheep, killing and wounding many of them and scattering the rest to the four winds. It was a vigorous and expensive notice to quit the country, but proved ineffective. The following day the scattered sheep were rounded up, but the herders made no move to drive their sheep elsewhere and the performance was repeated the following night with equally disastrous results.

Who the parties were is not reported nor the loss to Wolff. It is probable that the instigators of the stampede will never be definitely known, as such affairs are usually arranged carefully.

The feeling against the sheep man is evidently quite bitter in that section, and it seems as though there are enough men of intrepid spirit to wage open warfare on anyone threatening what they consider their rights.

Fourth on Prairie Dog.

One of the most enjoyable celebrations of Independence day took place at the MK ranch on Prairie Dog creek, in which two hundred of the ranchers in that section took part. The day started off with a big dinner, which was served by the ladies in first-class style. Then the day's sports began with a broncho busting contest, Charlie Day winning a six dollar prize by his skill as a horseman. Horse racing followed, a Circle Cross horse owned by George Marks and ridden by A. R. Shreve winning first money and a VN horse ridden by Charles Day getting second money. Leo Muller won the foot race for men and Jimmy Enoch captured the money for the boys' race. The ladies' race was won by Mrs. R. F. Stone and Nellie Rose beat in the girls' race. The day's fun wound up with a big country dance in the loft of the barn. The music started up about seven o'clock and kept up until about seven o'clock next morning. The music was furnished by Slater Bros. of Rancheater, John Lambert of Decker, Mr. Stover of Dewey and Tom Fox of Powder river. The donations towards expenses were liberal and fully covered same.
