The North coast limited train on the Northern Pacific was discontinued Monday, but there will be practically no change in the train service of the road. The change will be in name only, or rather in numbers. The new time card which also took effect on Monday, makes very little change in the arrival and departure of trains at Forsyth. Trains Nos. 1 and 2, the North Coast Limited which was pulled off, will be substituted by trains Nos. 11 and 12, arriving here about the same time. Train No. 12, east bound, corresponding to the old No. 2, will arrive at Forsyth at 12:15 p. m., forty-five minutes later than No. 2 arrived. Train No. 11, west bound, corresponding to the old No. 1, will arrive at 7:31 a. m. ten minutes later than previously. There are no changes in the arrival and departure of the night trains.
