## OPENING OF FORSYTH SCHOOL

### 162 Pupils Enrolled—Departmental System Adopted

School opened Tuesday with a total enrollment of 162 pupils.

First primary 18 pupils, Miss Blanchard teacher.

First and second primary 15 pupils, Miss Mau teacher.

Second and third grades 34 pupils, Miss Scally teacher.

Fourth and fifth grades 38 pupils, Mrs. Service teacher.

Sixth and seventh grades 27 pupils, Miss Ross teacher.

High school 30 pupils, H. Blair, Miss Fogelsong and Miss Beebe teachers.

Everything is started off in good order and the affairs of school are being conducted in a commendable manner. One of the most important changes made this year is the departmental system. This system has been adopted by many of the larger and better schools and is superior in its merits, being equally commendable for good work in either a large or small high school. Under the old system the teacher of the sixth and seventh grades taught all the classes in her respective grades, everything from physical culture to English grammar. Under the new system the work from the 6th grade up is divided into departments, each department being under the direct supervision of its head. The following is a classification of the departments: English and History, Miss Fogelsong; Latin and German, Miss Beebe; Mathematics, Miss Ross; Science, H. Blair. Under this system the teacher is able to do her best for the student, for instead of attempting to teach everything in the curriculum she is teaching her specialty or specialties, as the case may be. In addition there is a harmony about the work that could be obtained in no other manner. Under the management of one teacher the work in the grammar grades articulates perfectly with the high school work and for the steady advancement of the pupil this is no mean consideration.

The enrollment in the high school is larger than ever and everything bids fair for a profitable year's work. Supt. Blair has returned with a good stock of enthusiasm and assisted by his corps of efficient teachers will be able to place our schools one step in advance of where they now stand.
