NEW RAILROAD FOR FORSYTH

Rumored That the Montana Road Will Build to Forsyth

It is rumored, and presumably on good grounds to the effect that the Montana road will extend its line from Harlowton to Forsyth. The following is taken from the Montana Daily Record. "Within the past few days there has been a rumor in Meagher to the effect that the men back of the road have issued orders for the construction of 210 miles of road, and a surveying corps has actually begun work at a point about a mile from Harlowton. The understanding is that a branch line is to be constructed between Harlowton and Forsyth, in Rosebud county, a distance of 110 miles. The rumor has it that the remaining 100 miles to be built will be constructed from Harlowton to White Sulphur Springs, the Meagher capital, and thence to Helena, the supposition

being that this is to be done in order to forestall the Milwaukee in the event that it decides to find its way to the coast through the capital city. However this may be, the surveyors are at work in the field, and the people of Meagher county are watching the progress of the work with great interest." Should the Montana road be extended to Forsyth, it will to no extent solve the freight rate problem, but will open up a vast amount of territory to Forsyth, putting a new life and vigor, heretofore unknown, into business. Let the Montana road come. We will give her the right of way.
