QUEBEC, June 26.—A number of French Canadian citizens have banded themselves together and appointed a committee for the purpose of taking into consideration the position of the half-breeds implicated in the Northwest troubles, and to subscribe toward defraying their expenses in the coming trials.

Land Subsidies for Railway Purposes in the Northwest.

OTTAWA, June 26.—In the commons to-day, on the third reading of the bill granting subsidies of lands for railway purposes in Manitoba and the Northwest, Blake moved an amendment that all agricultural lands should be open for settlement at a fair maximum price.

The Cheyennes Evidently Determined to Fight.

WICHITA, Ks., June 29.—Dispatches Sunday morning and assurances from the department at Washington to the contrary notwithstanding, excitement is at fever heat at Reno and Darlington in the Territory and the attitude of the Cheyennes very threatening.

Darlington and Cantonment stand at the mercy of 3,000 braves, and a special says that the streams are rising rapidly between the agency and the fort. A few agency Indians are to be seen around the fort. The warriors have all gathered at a point two miles on the north fork.

The cantonment is sixty miles up the river and is perfectly helpless if an attack is made. There were, when the last Eagle's special was sent, nine companies of troops at Reno and one in Oklahoma, which had been ordered over; but before these troops could make a move two companies would have to be sent to the cantonment and two left at the agency, which would leave but six companies for the post and field.

The newly appointed minister to Rome is a man of great learning and an author of eminence. His record is that of a high minded and useful citizen. He is practical and energetic, as well as a man of books, in full sympathy with the spirit of progress, and his stay in Rome cannot but be of service to both the United States and the progressive country to which he is sent.

He is now somewhat above sixty years of age, and came to the United States from Germany forty-three years ago. Blessed with health, energy and considerable learning, the youth made a good start in life as a teacher in an educational institution at Cincinnati.

He served several years as a judge. When he first interested himself in American politics he joined the democratic party. In 1854 he left it on the slavery issue, being a strong anti-slavery man. He did not return to the democrats until 1872.

Because of the Cattlemen.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The outbreak of the Cheyenne Indians, which was threatened Saturday last, has been brewing for a year or longer. Army officials here attribute it to a dissatisfaction on the part of the Indians at the leasing of their reservation to cattlemen. The Cheyenne reservation is one of the largest in the Indian Territory—about 4,279,000 acres.



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
