occupation of Yap is intense, the populace is wild with rage. A large crowd gathered in front of the German embassy and attacked the building. They tore down the coat of arms and dragged it through the streets of the Puerta del Sol, where they burned it in front of the office of the interior, amid yells of, "down with Germany." After venting their spleen there, the mob proceeded to the French embassy and cheered frantically. The crowd had by this time grown to considerable proportions, and fears being entertained of a serious riot, the troops were ordered out to clear the streets. The crowd slowly retired before the military.

The situation is very grave. The council of ministers has accepted the proposition to court martial the Governor of Yap and the commander of the Spanish war ships, which arrived there on the 21st ult., for neglect of duty, the latter in not immediately garrisoning the island with Spanish soldiers upon their arrival there, and the former in not hoisting the Spanish flag and proclaiming the sovereignty of Spain over the island.

The report that the German squadron had sailed for the Caroline islands is confirmed.

Fifty-six leaders of the mob were arrested before the crowd retired.

The official report has been made concerning the cabinet council held this afternoon presided over by King Alfonso. The report says the government cannot now make known the measures decided upon, but that the country may rest assured that they were of an energetic character. The reports say that the government has decided that negotiations respecting an outrage on an integral part of the Spanish territory is impossible.

LONDON, September 5.—The Standard's Berlin correspondent says Spain has finally and decidedly declined to submit the Caroline affair to arbitration. Spain argues that the matter of Spanish jurisdiction over the islands is a fact so well known as not to admit of discussion. The German officials still scout the idea of war over the dispute.

An important meeting of leading liberals was held to-day at the residence of Signor Sagastia and after discussing the Caroline question it was resolved that the occupation of the island Yap by the German gun boat should be considered equivalent to a declaration of war, and if a crisis in the government should occur and liberals be called into power that they would withdraw Count de Benomar, Spanish ambassador at Berlin, and hand Count Solms Sonnenwalder, German ambassador at Madrid, his court credentials. It was also declared that the liberals would order the Spanish authorities at Philippine to recover territory in the Caroline islands taken possession of by Germany and to use force if necessary to regain it.

The adoption of the above resolutions has caused a great sensation.

The government has dismissed from service the commanders of the two Spanish men-of-war stationed at Yap.

BERLIN, September 5.—The news from Madrid concerning the Caroline affair is ridiculed here. It is believed that the report is overdrawn.

The Water Ways Convention.

ST. PAUL, September 4.—In the north-western waterways convention to-day, Senator Eustis, of Louisiana, made an address declaring the southern representatives were not hostile, as reported, but ready and willing to join in securing liberal appropriations for the upper Mississippi. Resolutions were adopted demanding from congress immediate and comprehensive improvements of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers and navigable tributaries to the fullest extent of their improvable capacity in accordance with the recommendations of the government engineers. Great stress was laid on the growth and wealth of the territory directly interested and the seeming neglect it heretofore suffered at the hands of congress as compared with other sections of the country.

The Hennepin canal and several minor projects were warmly endorsed. Annual appropriations of \$25,000,000 for the improvement of the rivers and harbors of the United States and the construction of artificial water ways was pronounced not extravagant, and are distinctly advocated in resolutions.

The convention adjourned *sine die*. The hearty reception accorded Senator Eustis, Major Burke and other southerners, as well as their harmonious action in the convention, is exciting much favorable comment.

All Quiet.

WASHINGTON, September 7.—The latest intelligence received at the war department from the scene of the recent disturbances in Wyoming is a dispatch from General Schofield to Gen. Drum dated yesterday, as follows: There is no report of further trouble since the troops went to the scene of the disturbance and none is likely to occur in the presence of the troops. I do not see now any necessity for further instructions being given.

The Sailing Race.

LONDON, September 2.—The Telegraph to-day, editorially, says: "Thousands of Englishmen and Americans, who cannot tell a yawl from a schooner, await with intense interest the Genesta and Puritan race on Monday. If the Genesta loses the race she will be beaten by the best yacht America can produce."

Alaska Exploring Expedition.

WASHINGTON, September 7.—Lieut. G. M. Stoney, commanding the Alaska expedition, reports to the navy department from St. Michaels, Alaska, June 30, that after leaving Ounala June 8th, he visited the new volcano on Bogosloo island and found the only changes since last years visit to be less discharge of smoke and steam and a small point making off from the northwest end. New volcano birds had commenced nesting in the new volcano. The party reached St. Michaels June 26th, after encountering heavy ice to the westward of St. Lawrence island. At St. Michaels Lt. Stoney secured nearly all the fur clothing required, also eighteen good dogs and three good teams. The dogs cost about \$150 dollars each in exchange for trade goods. An interpreter was also engaged, shipped as an ordinary seaman. Lt. Stoney intended taking with him two natives as drivers and the wife of one of them. He expected to leave at once for St. Lawrence bay and thence to proceed to Hotham inlet. All on board the steamer Viking were well and showed great interest in the work ahead of them.



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


